## Housing Problems to be Further Discussed by Town Council

### Teamsters Ask 75 Cents Per Hour. Their Request Referred to Board of Works.

The regular Monthly Meeting of the Town Council was held last night, all the members being present.

There were a number of communications to commence with some being important and others of lesser importance and very little time was lost in discussing them.

#### Extension of Union Street Objected to

The Kitchener City Planning Commission wrote that their plans for the opening up of several streets would be heard before the Provisional Board on Wednesday next in the City of Kitchener and as Union Street easterly was included and also a public street through the Cemetery it called the attention of the Council to the matter. The Council did not waste much time in discussing the above as they did not favor the idea at all and as it was pointed out the extension of these streets would be of no benefit to Waterloo; the town solicitor and Engineer Moogk will appear before the Board, objecting to same.

#### Refund of Taxes Refused

Mrs. M. Riddell wrote asking that a refund of taxes on a lot on Mary Street, amounting to \$10.58 be granted as the surface water down the hospital hill and along Union Street flooded this lot every spring making it unfit for sale, owing to it being damp and wet. As the natural water course is through this lot no action was taken.

#### No Action Taken

There was no action taken on the request of the Ontario Municipal Electric Association that each municipality be represented on the Hydro Electric Commission. The reason given was that the Ontario Government has prorogued the communication came to hand too late to be effective this session.

#### Favorable to Trunk Roadways

A resolution will be forwarded to the local member in the Federal House favoring the Government's scheme for the building of trunk roadways to connect with the main public highways.

#### Fuel Committee

Reeve Bohlender gave a verbal report of the Fuel Committee which met prior to the Council meeting at which the price of wood was fixed at \$9.00 per cord for rough wood, \$12.00 per cord for first class and \$15.00 per cord for second class.

#### Will Pay Insurance on Dead Horse

Verification of the death of Pte. Fleming who was killed in action last year was received and the council endorsed the paying over of the \$500 insurance to his dependants.

#### Re-Right of Way

Mr. Kroetch addressed the Council at some length in regard to an error in assessing his property the taxes on the right of way being charged up to one man which was not right. He claimed he had received no assessment notice and therefore could not appeal and his idea of bringing the matter before the Council was to have the matter adjusted and the proper parties assessed. The Mayor assured him the matter would be looked into and straightened out.

#### Arrears of Taxes Nearly Cleared

Tax collector J. Uffelmann was present and read a list of the arrears of taxes, showing that outside of vacant lots, which will be put upon

the market and sold, there is very little else outstanding and all will be accounted for in the course of a few weeks. In answer to Mr. Cochran as to what the total amount was, Mr. Uffelmann replied it was in the neighborhood of \$2000 and \$2500. The collector will proceed forthwith and sell the lots in arrears by public auction.

#### No Half Holiday for M.-O. Opening

The Council turned down unanimously the request from the Secretary of the Kitchener M.-O. Baseball Team that a half holiday be proclaimed in Waterloo on the date of the opening game in Kitchener on May 19th.

#### Shed Is on Street Line

A complaint was received by the Council that vehicles belonging to Mr. W. Hogg are allowed to obstruct the sidewalk on the corner of Allan and Caroline Street. Engineer Moogk stated that the shed in which the vehicles are placed at night extends 8 feet over the street line it having been built many years ago. The objection was that when the rigs are put in at night the tongues of the wagons project on the street and pedestrians are liable to trip over them causing injury for which the town would be liable. However, the Councilors were of the opinion that the matter called to the attention of Mr. Hogg, the nuisance would be stopped and the clerk was instructed to write him to this effect.

#### Board of Works and Police Com.

The report of the Board of Works which included the graveling of John Street, East, that the present rate of wages and hours be continued, and that the chairman purchase the necessary oil for the oiling of certain streets was adopted as was also the report of the Police Commission which showed the amount of fines collected during the past month and which amounted to an even \$99.00.

#### Investigation

Two by-laws one for the borrowing of \$300 on account of the Herbert Street Extension and one for the spending of \$1,200 on public laboratories were given their third readings and passed. G.P.R. and G.T.R. Crossings

#### Request Early Call on G.P. & H.

Reeve Bohlender brought up the question of requesting the G.P. & H. to have the early morning car, which leaves Kitchener at 6 o'clock, start from Waterloo and thus enable our citizens to take advantage of this service. The request will be sent by the clerk with the hope that the request will be granted.

#### Business and adjournment

This concluded the business and adjournment was made at 10:45 p.m.

At the conclusion of the Council meeting last night the Town Property Committee met when tenders were opened for the building of new cattle yards on the site of the present old and dilapidated ones. The old yards comprise four yards but the plans for the new one only call for three which will be ample for all needs. Mr. Henry Jaob's tender being the lowest was accepted the price being in the neighborhood of approximately \$500.00 work will be commenced as soon as possible.

#### MR. EMIL C. SCHULTZ RESIGNS SUPERINTENDENCY OF GLOBE FURNITURE CO WATERLOO

Mr. Schultz has been with the Globe Company for about eight years and during the family's period of residence here they have made many friends. Their going is a loss to the community. The good wishes of citizens of the Twin City are with them for the future.

Our Minister's Honeymoon in the Town Hall to-night by St. John's Lutheran Church Choir promises to be the treat of the season. Admis-

sion 35 cents, children 25 cents. It will receive immediate attention and for the time being boards will be laid for the convenience of the ratepayers on the said street.

Engineer Moogk presented a list of the properties on King street where the water from the roof overruns the sidewalk making it extremely dangerous especially in winter when the weather is below freezing. Several have signified their willingness to have the nuisance done away with and the others will again be notified by the clerk to have the matter remedied.

Action was deferred on the communication from night Policeman Clark in regard to his salary and the number of hours he is on the job the matter being left to the Police Commission.

#### Teamsters want increase

A request was received from the teamsters of the town stating that on and after May 5th their rate for a 9 hour day would be 75 cents per hour. Deputy Reeve Stroh objected to this stating the notice was too short as the letter had been sent to the Mayor only on Saturday night last. Nothing had been said either to him or the Engineer that they were dissatisfied with the present scale of wages and it looks as if someone is working behind his back. It is not fair to bring in a request of this kind on such short notice and if the council settles it to-night it will open it to him. Mayor Kunt did not favor setting it right away as it was a matter for the Board of Works to deal with and his recommendation to refer it to the Board was carried.

#### The Housing Problem

Councillor Sturm in speaking on the proposed Housing scheme said that while the notices only appeared in the papers on Saturday evening a number had come in to him favoring it. As far as he was concerned he thought it one of the best schemes possible as it enabled the poor man to have a house of his own at small monthly payments. Naturally there are many who opposed it who were the rich men who out of jealousy did not want to see the poor man get ahead. With a proper understanding the idea would work out alright and he had no doubt 100 houses could be sold if they were built according to the suggestion of the government. There were members of the Council however who did not see eye to eye with Mr. Sturm but as little changes have been given to see just how big the demand will be the matter was laid over for a few days and in the meantime the committee appointed last Friday will go ahead and gather more information as to the number who will buy providing the scheme is sanctioned by the Council.

Major Kunt gave a verbal report on the committee appointed to secure a site for the Waterloo Sping works they being willing to remove from their present building providing more suitable land can be secured. Several sites were visited but so far nothing decided on and the committee were instructed to investigate further.

#### By-Laws

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#### G.P.R. and G.T.R. Crossings

The town solicitor was instructed to write the G.P. & H. that the tracks on Caroline street near William street were almost unpassable for autos and rigs and requesting them to have same put in good condition. A similar request will be sent to the G.T.R. in respect to the crossing on King street.

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## Additional City Items

### MORE NAMES ON THE EXECUTIVE

Alternative Step is Taken in Lieu of Organizing Lady Branch, Navy League.

At a meeting in the City Hall yesterday afternoon the question of organizing a ladies' auxiliary for the Navy League was discussed. Miss Reynolds of Toronto was present for the purpose. Those present were Mr. I. K. Master, president of the local branch of the Navy League, Mr. J. H. Dobbin, Mr. W. Collins, Capt. S. Boal, and Miss Bruce.

As the result of the conference the executive of the local branch of the Navy League has been added to so that the purpose otherwise fulfilled by a ladies' auxiliary can be carried out. The following names were added to the Executive: Miss Agnes Jackson, Mrs. F. Hodgins, Mrs. H. J. Sims, Mrs. C. H. Mills, Mrs. W. H. Brethaupt, Rev. Father Fischer, Rev. Mr. Lang-Ford, Mrs. August Lang, Mr. Water Hartung and Mayor Gross.

The point under consideration by the conference was the organization of an auxiliary by the ladies. Miss Reynolds and Capt. Boal outlined how it would be advantageous to have such an organization assisting the general body. The ladies could accomplish much work that the men could not do. Educational work among the school children on the navy league and the securing of materials were mentioned as only a few things that the ladies could better look after than the men.

One difficulty that was alluded to by the local attendants was the fact that it is so difficult in this city where there are so many organizations each doing a good work to have a big attendance of members. Capt. Boal alluded to the necessity of education on the work so that the people who had subscribed to the league would really know what the navy league is for. He informally dealt with the importance of the merchant marine and emphasized what it meant to Canada. It was essential that not only the executive meet occasionally but that the whole organization get together frequently so that they can learn what it is being done.

Miss Reynolds informed the conference that photographs of the deeds of the British navy in the great war, including among others, the attack on Zebrugg and the surrender of the Germans, were being shown and addressed through the medium of the League. In this way also educational work was being done. It was the intention to show these and to have addresses before the respective branches.

After some consideration the attendants deemed it best to widen the executive of the local navy league instead of organizing an auxiliary. The idea was favored by Miss Reynolds and Capt. S. Boal. The Committee will meet in the near future to consider the work. Besides the educational phase of the question that will be dealt with in the coming months is the July drive for increased membership.

### Eloquent Appeal to Navy League

Capt. (Rev) S. Boal Speaks Before Council  
An eloquent appeal for the navy league was made last evening by Capt. (Rev) S. Boal before the City Council.

The distinguished speaker in his appeal for the widows and orphans showed what the merchant marine of the Empire had meant for the Empire and Canada. Assistance to the dependants of the deceased men, who had given their lives was a duty the people owed to the heroes. As to one question that is sometimes asked why not let the government look after the cause, he pointed out that this was not the point. Was one to wait for action while it was known that the widows and orphans needed the assistance. There were \$5,000 such dependants of the 15000 deceased men.

The speaker recounted the success of his appeal in a few other places, among them being Cornwall County Council, \$5000; Brockville, \$1000; Sudbury, \$5000; Cobalt \$1000, Cochrane, so forth throughout the country.

If Canada was to become a still greater county, a great export one, there were duties to perform, as he said two years ago and as he repeated now, the day would have to come when she would have a merchant fleet of her own commanded by Canadian men. He referred to the keen competition

with manufacturing countries turning out cheap goods and putting them on our Canadian market. No matter how cheap or clever the manufacturers were, they could not compete. He insisted, product, the button. A complete line was now being made in this country at a price with which our manufacturers could not compete.

During the course of his appeal Rev. Mr. Boal paid a tribute to this city for its beautiful homes, cleanliness and its thriving industries. 'One of the finest in Canada he termed it. The City was a great manufacturing centre, shipping many goods across the Atlantic. Therefore it was to the city's good to support the merchant marine and stand by those who are carrying on the work on the seas.

Referring to the grant he said that out of \$1,000,000 received last year not one cent of this went to any other purpose but that of the widows and orphans. There should be no doubt in the minds of anyone therefore as to the money to be expended. Payments could be made monthly or quarterly as desired.

Incidentally during his reference to the city which he reiterated was one of beautiful homes he remarked that the city might well erect a handsome city hall as a monument to those men who had fallen overseas. By doing so the City could set aside quarters also for its returned men to carry on their work.

Rev. Mr. Boal in concluding the address thanked the Mayor and Council for their courtesy.

Mayor Gross replied that all must have been touched by the address. Whether the Council would wish to deal with the matter immediately or at a Finance meeting was for them to say. There was no question but that the cause was a worthy one and would be given the consideration it deserved.

Rev. Mr. Boal stated it was not necessary that he receive the money immediately. Some resolution would suffice. On the motion of Aldermen Greb and Lippert the matter was referred to the Finance Committee.
