Sandwich West Tp. Council Sends By-Law to Ratepayers.
The Windsor Council of Sandwich West Township held a special meeting to deal with the Railway purchase plan and the first and second readings of the by-law were given without any of the threatened opposition developing. This is the first municipality to take action on the matter, and for this reason the meeting was an important one.

St. Marys By-Laws.
St. Marys citizens voted on two by-laws one for \$6000 to erect a monument to the town's fallen heroes in the great war and the other for \$5,000 to obtain and erect a club house for returned men of the town. There was but a small vote, the result being a majority of 84 for the monument while the clubhouse by-law was defeated by 57.

Galt Lady Teachers Want More.
"Galt public school board is again faced with that troublesome question salary increases, having received a petition from the lady teachers' association requesting a minimum of \$1,200 with an increase of \$100 at New Year's in addition to the regular increase of \$50, provided for in the present schedule. Reasons for asking for the new salary schedule is the increased cost of living and what is alleged an unfairness in the present schedule. It is claimed that some teachers engaged in September were receiving \$800, while others on the staff, two or three years were not getting that amount. With the teachers requesting a reply before the end of the month it is concluded that if they do not receive their demands that there may be a number of resignations. A rule of the board insists that all resignations must be in before the end of May and November.

Just a year ago a similar petition was received from the lady teachers and the maximum salary increased to \$900.

Mr. Linton, Galt Resigns.
When the Galt schools close in December for the Christmas holidays, William Linton, who has been principal of Victoria School for the past 20 years, will retire from the profession. His resignation has been handed in to the school board with the request that it take effect at the end of the year. Mr. Linton has taught school for the past 45 years, and during his principalship at Victoria School has made an enviable record. His retirement is not only regretted by the school board of Galt but by the profession at large.
