

### Clearing House Figures.

Local clearing house figures for the week are \$72,823 and for the same week last year \$683,373.23.

### Died At Institution.

Mrs. Mary Jenson, aged 87 years, died in the local House of Refuge. Cause of death were the infirmities of advanced age. She was born in Germany and was a widow. She has no relatives in this city, but some in Toronto, who will look after the burial.

### Cedar Springs Deserter Fined \$250.

Charles Buschke, a Belgian, who was arrested at Cedar Springs, charged with being a deserter from the C.E.F., was fined \$250, with the option of spending six months in jail, when he was convicted by Police Magistrate Graydon at London. Lorne Mank of this county, who is alleged, defaulted under the M.S.A., told the Magistrate that he was simply too scared to report when ordered. He was sent to jail on remand pending a medical examination.

### LEFT TO RAILWAY BOARD Clause Struck out by Senate Reinserted—Provincial Rights

Ottawa, April 23.—A question of the possibility of serious infringement of provincial rights was cleared this morning by the special committee of the Commons which is dealing with the new Consolidated Railway Act. The difficulty arises out of the action of the Senate in striking out of the bill a clause containing the general provision that when a railway operating under a provincial charter is taken over by a company with a Federal franchise it comes immediately under the jurisdiction of the Railway Board. The matter was discussed at a previous meeting when Captain Thomas Watson moved that the clause be reinserted in the bill. Hon. F.B. Carvell expressed himself as being in favor of the proposed change. It was important he thought that the Railway board should, in so far as possible be given control over the operation of railways, more particularly as there are no railroad boards in the majority of the provinces. Mr. Kilmer on behalf of the Attorney-General of the province of Ontario expressed the fear that the clause as drafted was confusing. The motion that the clause should be reinserted in the bill was adopted on a vote of 12 to 2. Mr. Lemieux and Mr. Casgrain were the members of the committee who voted nay.

### Favor-Nov. 11 For Thanksgiving.

The directors of the Brantford Chamber of Commerce have forwarded to Ottawa a proposal that Canada's national Thanksgiving Day be set for November 11, armistice day, in perpetuity.

### London Council and School Board Clash.

Fresh threats were heard in London yesterday from the Board of Education as a result of the City Council's action in throwing out the School Trustees' scheme for educational development during the present building season.

An intimation reached Mayor Sommerville that certain of the trustees will apply for an injunction restraining the Council from proceeding to collect taxes under the 2 1/2 mill rate recently struck. The ground of the application would be that the city has not given consideration to the estimates of the Board of Education in striking the rate.

### Mayor Sommerville declared that if the trustees wish to pursue such a course they will probably get less from the Council next year.

### Hamilton Insurance Man Drowned.

John Lennox, head of John Lennox & Co., Hamilton, was drowned at the Beach yesterday. He went to the Beach with two of his employees. While they were at work about Mr. Lennox's summer cottage, he took a rowboat and rowed out in the bay about 500 yards. The employees saw him engaged in fishing, and then went about their work. In a few minutes they looked up, to discover that the boat was empty and Mr. Lennox had disappeared.

### Stratford G.W.V.A. Would Purchase Building.

The Stratford City Council was asked last night by a deputation from the Great War Veterans with the request that a by-law be submitted to the people for \$30,000 to purchase a home for the Stratford association. An option has been secured by the Veterans on the old Arlington Hotel property, which was at one time the Liberal Club rooms, and it is estimated that for \$30,000 it can be purchased and put in proper condition for the Veterans, with billiard tables, bowling alleys and the bowling greens, etc. The matter was referred to a committee of the Whole Council to meet the War Veterans to discuss the proposal. The Council will also take up in Committee of the Whole the matter of a suitable memorial for local men who have fallen in the Great War.
