Of the above, 67 pairs of socks were sent forward to our men. One box to hospital supplies containing 54 suits of pyjamas and one dressing gown. In addition to the above, proceeds of Mrs. Richmond's concert—\$78.52—are to be added to the funds of the Society. Gross receipts, \$122.25. Expenses—Davidson Bros., 975; Opera House, \$25.00; J. E. Hales & Co., \$5.03; sundries, \$3.95; total, \$43.73. The Society is grateful for this substantial addition to its much needed funds, a need that is every month becoming greater.

Indian Immigration.

On more than one occasion reference has been made to the fact that India's participation in the war was bound to force on the other colonies a new consideration of the problem of India's relations to those colonies. A returned missionary preaching in St. John's church on Sunday morning is reported as telling his congregation that one of the greatest problems that confronts the British Empire at the present day is the question of whether men from India are to be admitted to the other parts of the Empire. This very question was the subject of consideration at the recent Imperial War Conference in London, and important suggestions submitted by the representatives of India were recommended to the favorable consideration of the colonial governments concerned. These suggest as a basis of agreement that Indians already settled in colonial possessions be permitted to bring in their wives, (subject of course to the rule of monogamy) and minor children, and be given privileges not less than those accorded Japanese; that regulations restricting other immigration be on similar lines to those applied to other Asiatics. If this is deemed impossible then it is suggested that some reciprocal agreement be reached for immigration for labor and settlement purposes, and that where a colony excludes these classes India be free to adopt the same policy, both parties recognizing the right of travel of tourists, students and persons engaged in business, so long as this temporary residence is not for labor purposes or permanent settlement. A clause of this memorandum suggests that any colony demanding exclusion do so on the ground, not of race prejudice, but as a necessity to overcome different economic conditions. This brief summary of the requests India makes of the other colonies indicates a willingness to recognize, on China and Japan have recognized, that the problem of Asiatic immigration is a many-sided one. It has an imperial as well as a colonial aspect, and in its consideration the colonies will be expected to bear that fact in mind and to avoid creating difficulties which add to the difficulties of governing India. The problem of Indian Immigration is at the present largely a western problem, but it is quite conceivable that in time Eastern Canada will also have to think of the suggestions made to the Imperial War Conference--E.K.

What National Service Did.

The efforts of the National Service Board and the Government to secure farm help to meet the pressing needs of the agricultural situation in Western Canada have been a complete success. Reports have been received by the Government from the western provinces that there is now a sufficient supply of labor and for the present there is no need for any further effort. Early in the year it looked as if it would be a serious shortage of labor which would seriously affect the crop acreage this season. Mr. R. B. Bennett, Director of National Service, went west and took the matter up personally, ally with the western governments. As a result plans of co-operation between the provincial and federal authorities and the National Service Board were formulated, and an extensive advertising campaign was inaugurated in the western states, at that time the only source of supply on a large scale. The campaign was quite successful. Some six thousand skilled farm laborers, mostly farmers' sons from the great central and western States, used to western methods of farming were secured. This, combined with the men the National Service Board was able to secure in the western cities, has resulted in supplying all the men the farmers of the west need for their spring sowing. The results are extremely gratifying to the Government, and any crop shortage this year will at least not be due to lack of labor.

Resigns from School Board.

DR. SAWYER WILL GO EAST. Dr. E. W. Sawyer, who is now visiting his daughter, Mrs. Armstrong, in Edmonton, has tendered his resignation to the School Board, urging that it be accepted as it is his intention to go to Woodstock, Ont., where he has been given an appointment to the teaching staff of the Baptist College. Up to the time of his recent bereavement Dr. Sawyer, since his appointment to the School Board, had been taking an active part in public school affairs. His paper on a feature of the public school work in this province, read at the last convention of the trustees of the province, was exceptionally well received, and Dr. Sawyer was asked to study the subject further and report at the convention which is to meet this summer. It is to be regretted that his going east will make this impossible. Possibly he can be induced to write another paper to be read at the convention. It is expected that before going east Dr. Sawyer will come to Sunnyside to be met here by his son Edmund, who has been in Central America--Summerland, B. C., recently.
