The above list does not include the correspondence of the chief officers of the Department with their assistants and the public, which averages over 8,000 letters per year, nor the Departmental and other cheques sent out, of which 4,396 were mailed during the fiscal year ended 30th June, 1886.

† The decrease in the number of letters received and sent is not caused by any actual diminution of letters, but by a change in the manner of fyling since 1st April. Up to that date all accounts were registered singly, and a letter accompanied each payment. Now, accounts are fyled by subjects, as many as thirty or forty accounts being sometimes covered by one number; and printed slips have been substituted for the letters which formerly accompanied payments. A very considerable saving of time has been effected by these changes, and the business of the Department greatly facilitated.
