
With reference to your letter of the 11th instant, I beg to enclose for your information copy of a letter this date addressed to Chief Josiah G. Monague, of the Christian Island Band, who visited the Department today along with Secretary Walter Simon and two Councillors, Joseph Copegog and Edward Monague.

With regard to the complaint of Henry Jackson and Solomon Marks, I have to request that you will be good enough to advise these Indians that they should work in harmony with the Band.

As to the question of the admission of non-treaty Indians into membership of the Christian Island Band, you will observe that the delegation were informed that upon their advising the Department when it will be suitable to the members of their Band and also to those members of the Band who reside on Parry Island, to hold a meeting for the consideration of this question, Mr. McGibbon will be instructed to take the matter up.
