The commission controls bakeries in Athens and pireus. Three of the largest flour mills have been placed at the disposal of the Commission, which are supervised by a Swedish flour mill expert.

There are 1,600 local committees in different parts of the country. These local committees keep the Commission informed of the requirements for relief in the various communities. During the month of October the relief distribution reached a million people in the rural districts of Greece."

## 3. Changes in passport regulations:-

In reply to an enquiry made by Mr. Marshall Mr. Wrong expressed the hope that within a few weeks it would be possible to announce a definite easing of border crossing facilities.

## 4. Censorship by Department of External Affairs:-

Mr. Blackburn referred to a report concerning the criminal proceedings which were being undertaken against the United States soldier in canada. It was his impression that the Department of External Affairs had asked Gensorship to prevent this story from being made public. Mr. Wrong stated that he had no information of this but that he would make immediate enquiries. In confidence he advised the press that the question had been raised whether canada would allow the United States to establish their own military courts within canada and that the Canadian Government was opposed to such a step being taken.

## 5. Recent story by Bushnell Hart:-

Asked for comment on this story recently carried by A.P.

Mr. Wrong stated that the significant point of the story was the
fact that Bushnell Hart was eighty-eight years of age. He was
surprised that the Associated Press had given its space to publish
such a story.
