

The exemptions are substantially the same as in the other two Provinces, with the addition of parties connected with Her Majesty's Navy Yard, Ordnance, and other Departments, Mail Couriers, sworn Electric Telegraph Operators, and the Cashiers and Accountants and Tellers actually employed in the several Banks, and persons who have served on the Grand or Petty Juries within the three previous years (unless in the latter instance, in case of a default of Jurors).

In every alternate year, the Sessions select from their number a Committee of not less than three Justices, resident in different sections of the County or District, to prepare and revise the Jury Lists; they are sworn; have free access to all public papers and accounts, prepare and revise the lists, and transmit copies thereof to the Prothonotary; and the lists are valid if a majority of the Justices appointed act in the compilation or return thereof.

The lists for both Grand and Petit Jurors, must contain the Christian and surnames, or one or more of the initials, the trades, employments, residences, and distinctive appellations by which known, or usually called.

The Court of General Sessions in each County, from time to time, determines the number of Grand Jurors to be annually summoned for each district, &c., &c.

The Committee, after completing these lists, must give a copy alphabetically arranged to the Clerk of the Peace, and another to the Prothonotary, who are to post the same up in their respective offices for one month; and within two months from the last day of Sessions, at which they were appointed, the Committee, or a majority, must meet at the County or District Court House, to revise the lists (notice of such time being given on the lists posted up), and shall hear and decide objections as to the names therein, or the names omitted therefrom.

The lists so corrected, a copy must be signed and furnished by the Committee to the Prothonotary, and the lists are then to be held valid, notwithstanding omissions, or improper insertions of names.

The Jury Lists are to be revised by the Justices, by making a list of the Jurors who die or become exempt, or who are to be added to the lists already returned, and the lists are to be so amended accordingly, and considered the fully revised lists; but the Sessions, or a Judge of the Supreme Court, may direct the Revising Committee to make out and return fresh lists.

The lists are to be kept posted up in the Prothonotary's Office, and as the Juries are drawn to serve each year, the year is marked opposite the Juror's name, and whether as Grand or Petit Juror.

The Grand Jury, in General Session, annually vote \$1.50 to each of the Committee who revise, and five cents per mile travelling fees, going and returning, and ten cents per folio for copying.

Any Revising Justice knowingly putting on unqualified person, or omitting qualified person, or wilfully neglecting his duty, penalty \$40 to \$200.

Provision is made to meet exceptional case when Grand or Petit Jury have not been drawn for current year, and forms given for revised lists. The Revising Committee of Justices are to be chosen biennially, and some special provisions are made with reference to Halifax, St. Mary's and Guysborough.

After the return of the lists, the Prothonotary has the names of the Jurors written on ballot slips, and put in the Grand and Petit Jury Boxes respectively.

At the sitting of the Court, on the last term in each year, the Prothonotary, with two persons appointed by the Judge, draws from the Grand Jury Box in open Court, the twenty-four Grand Jurors for the ensuing year, striking out the names of those who have served within two years next preceding. The list is signed by the Presiding Judge. The Prothonotary issues the *venire* to the Sheriff twenty days before the sittings of the Court or Session at which such Jury is to attend, and the Sheriff summons them at least four days before time of attendance.

At each term of the Supreme Court, the Prothonotary draws in the same way from the Petit Jury Box the panel of the Petit Jurors, setting aside names of those who have
