We have distributed upwards of a million volumes of books in the New World, this being one of the most interesting and beautiful of the whole, comprising thirty double page engraved places, among which we notice the Planisphere supported by Hercules, A LARGE and SPLENDID PORTRAIT of GEORGE THE FIRST, Nova Totius Terrarum Oibis, Poli Arctici, Russia et Nova Zenila, Finmarchia et Laplanda, Novega Maritima, Magnum Mare del Zur Cum Insula, California, Nova Hispania, Chili, Peruvia, Amerca, Meridionalis Brasilia Terra Nova Novam Ffanciam, Ang-LIAM, BELGIUM, Nevezuelam Novam Andalusiam, Gueanam, Brasileam, Indeatum Occidentalium, Septemtrionaliora Americæ, a Groenlandis, per Freta Davidis et Hudson ad Terram Novam, each Map being adorned with fine old cornerpiece engravings and accompanied with either two or four pages of

Boston Telegraph, Afterwards Incorporated and continued with the RECORDER AND RELIGIOUS TELEGRAPH, a 4 page imp. folio newspaper, from February 26, 1824, down to December 25, 1828, 5 vols, imp folio, half roan, A SCARCE, VALUABLE and USEFUL LOT, 16.50.

Abounds with valuable Historical Memoranda of every description, the first number in the first volume, we notice, has short articles respecting the REVOLUTIONARY PENSIONERS, Negro Slavery, Proclamation for a day of Humiliation by the Governor W. Eustis, of Massachusetts, Congressional Proceedings, etc., and the last number has articles on the Poor in Boston, Abolition of Slavery, Original Poetry, Interesting Advertisements, etc., each volume has a good Index but no Titles were published. Of its scarcity there can be no question, and the paper is in capital condition.
