Mr. Hurteau — Because I feel that you have insulted me. His Lordship — How did I insult you?

Mr. HURTEAU — Well, I am a French Canadian too. His Lordship — Yes, but you can talk English can you not?

Mr. Hurteau — Yes.

His LORDSHIP - Well, I didn't say anything that should insult you, I said that any one who has lived in this Province for twenty years and couldn't speak English ought to be deported, and I say it again. People who come from foreign lands to live in this country should learn to speak the English language, I think every one should learn to speak English and it is a disgrace for a man to live here twenty years with good schools to go to, and not to learn to speak the English language, it shows that he hasn't tried to learn it, but I didn't say anything that could insult you, and I would like you to act as interpreter for this man.

Mr. Hurteau — Very well.
