DANGEROUS MADMAN.

Attacks a Woman and Turns Highwayman Near Windsor.—Finally Recaptured.

Windsor, July 5.—Sergeant Jackson and Patrolman Reid had an exciting chase yesterday after Joseph Reaume, a well-known farmer of Sandwich East, who escaped Tuesday from the Hotel Dieu, where he was sent last Friday suffering with an affection of the brain, which has since developed into violent insanity. After escaping from the hospital, Reaume wandered around all night and early yesterday morning walked into the yard of Mrs. Francois, at Dougall and Tecumseh roads. The woman was hitching up her horse, when he suddenly jumped on the horse's head and jumped on the horse's back, and finally turned on the C. P. railway, riding at break-neck speed down the track. He turned off at Paul St. Amour's farm on the Grand Marais road, where he changed horses without the owner's permission. A little farther on, at Joe Cousineau's hotel, he made another exchange without consulting the owner, and reaching the M. C. R. started down the track towards Windsor.

Reaume turned off the track when he reached the Tecumseh road and was overtaken by the officers at Patrick Janes's place, where he was was quietly picking flowers. He will be sent to an asylum.
