Township Councils.

HARWICH COUNCIL.

A meeting of the Municipal Council of Harwich was held in the Township ship Hall, Monday, June 10th, 1901. Members all present. Minutes of the meeting of May 13 were read and adopted. Communications were read from the following:

Messrs. Wilson, Kerr & Pike, re account paid.

The Ontario Government re road to Government Park, at Road East.

Lake Erie R. R. re gravel at Rich-

bury and other places.

Michigan Central Railway re gravel at Mill station.

Dr. Dunlop re care of W. Slann, at Hospital.

A. L. Arnold, caretaker at H. of Refuge re one Badgley.

From Adam Henry, claiming damages from the township on account of water coming down on him from the Spring Creek Drain.

A counter petition was presented by ratepayers of S. S. No. 5, asking the council to take no action re separation of said section.

The Reeve and Clerk reported that Mr. Fred. Arnold refused to sign the agreement re earth at Kent Bridge as drawn up, and referred that matter back to the council.

An award of fence viewers between John J. McCoig and Ellen Titus was read.

Hiram Ensign presented a requisition asking to be relieved of water doing him injury by the repair of the English Drain.

Moved by Young and McCormick, that the Reeve and Councilors Young and Buchanan be a committee to wait on our solicitor and place the matter of the trouble in connection with the Spring Creek Drain, and drains flowing into it, and all plans and papers in connection with it, before him, and get his opinion for the guidance of this council.—Carried.

Also, that the Reeve visit the House of Refuge and take such action as will free the Township of Harwich from the responsibility of maintaining on L. Badgley, either by paying his railway fare and sending him to some of his relatives, or by giving official notice to the proper authorities that Harwich will keep him no longer.—Carried.

Moved by Buchanan and Morrison, that Commissioner McCormick be instructed to have the covered drain at Fargo put in a safe condition as per report.—Carried.

Moved by Buchanan and Morrison, that the clerk correspond with Mr. Edwin Bell of Chatham and find out what a half an acre or an acre of land for a gravel pit could be bought for along the Gore Line on the north side of the Ridge Road on pt. lot 9 & 4, W. C. R.—Carried.

Tape, \$2.66 for two lambs worried; J. C. Wilson, \$4 for two lambs worried; charge to dog fund.—Carried.

Moved by Wilson and Brien, that a reward of \$50 be paid to any person or persons capturing a dog worrying sheep; same amount of reward to be given to the party giving evidence to prove ownership of dogs which they unlawfully intrude on the annoyance of passers by.—Carried.

Moved by Balmer and Wilson, that J. C. Williams be appointed to examine Brown drain and make necessary repairs, also ditch north of Brown drain, townline, Harwich and Howard.—Carried.

Moved by Wilson and Balmer, that Jas. Cunningham be refunded 30c, error on assessment roll for 1900.—Carried.

Moved by Brien and Williams, that the report of J. S. Boothroyd and J. C. Williams on bridge at Morpeth be received.—Carried.

Moved by Balmer and Wilson, that a grant of \$50 be made to Div. No. 4, to furnish sewer pipe for drain in said division, and charge to general fund.—Carried.

Moved by Williams and Brien, that a grant of \$50 be made to village of Morpeth and Mr. John Duck be appointed commissioner to expend same.—Carried.

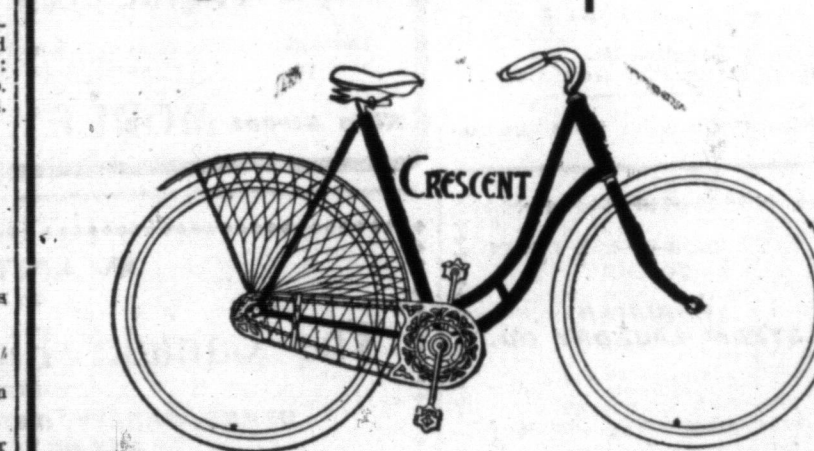
