SIR WILFRID WILL GO

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Britain's treaty obligations to foreign countries. When approached on the subject of imperial defence Sir Wilfrid's reply to the imperial authorities had been that Canada was establishing a local naval force in the waters of Canada. Mr. Borden would like to know how far the Government had progressed with its naval scheme.

The Cattle Embargo.
He would like to have known what was Canada's attitude on the cattle embargo? It was known the embargo had been instituted and maintained, not because of disease in Canadian cattle, but as a measure of protection to the British farmer. The British Government could protect as they liked, but it was not fair that that protection should be effected by an embargo which casts discredit on Canadian cattle.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in reply, said the very fact that Canada had offered no suggestions to the conference was the best evidence that the relations between Canada and the Empire were so satisfactory that they could not be improved. He was ready to go to London, not to make suggestions, but to receive those of the Home Government and the sister colonies.

He did not view with a permanent imperial council. The only question in which Canada was particularly interested was the trade question, and in this Canada had nothing to offer.

Her position had been laid down at the conference of 1902, namely that Canada had already given a preference, and if the British people would reciprocate, Canada would go one step further than she had done. But this policy had not found favor with the British people, and it was for them to make up their own mind without dictation from Canada.

The British Empire could only be maintained upon the principle that every one of the nations which compose it shall be allowed to determine for itself what is best for it. Sir Wilfrid's own view was that the ideal condition would be to have free trade between all parts of the British Empire. But at present that was not possible.

Will Not Consent.
As for imperial defence, he did not know that existing conditions could be improved upon. Certainly Canada would never consent to be drawn into the vortex of European militarism. In the way of immigration he thought the present policy a good one. Owing to it an increasing number of immigrants were coming from the British Isles.

When in London he could take up with Premier Deakin the question of preferential trade with Australia, and would doubtless accomplish an arrangement.

The cattle embargo did not seem to be a proper matter for the conference, but the Government would continue to press upon the imperial authorities the advisability of its withdrawal.

the allegations set out in the bill, and into any other matters which the board may deem necessary in connection therewith, report to the House whether or not it is reasonable that such bill or the part thereof relating to the matters aforesaid, should be passed, and what alterations, if any, should be made in the same, and the board shall make such enquiry accordingly and shall sign the same; and the said report, bill and petition shall be transmitted to the clerk and the report shall be read by the clerk at the table and shall be entered on the journals of the House, and the bill together with the report shall stand referred to the Standing Committee on Private Bills.

Municipal Debts.

Hon. Mr. Whitney, speaking on his motion, said the Legislature daily was subject to the greatest possible danger in private legislation getting through which should not be allowed to pass. He therefore thought the Railway and Municipal Board should pronounce on its propriety and desirability.

Mr. Graham concurred. Some municipalities, he said, were up to the limit in indebtedness and carrying illegal overdrafts from year to year. The proposal would not divest the Legislature of the ultimate responsibility.

Law Reform Motion.

The first "want of confidence" motion is promised by the following notice:

Mr. Cameron (West Huron) gives notice that he will on Thursday next, the 4th day of April, move that this House regrets that His Majesty's advisers have not introduced in the House any measure respecting the subject of law reform.

The House adjourned for a week for Easter tide.

TWO MORE WELLS

The Volcanic Oil & Gas Company, who have the franchise for supplying the natural gas used in the city, have added two more wells to their possessions in the Tilbury field. One of these is situated on the Richardson property, just across the road from the Maple City Oil & Gas Company's well. Gas was struck there yesterday and they now have a well producing a million and a half feet per day. It will be drilled in and improved right away.

The other new well is on the Graham property. This well is a good producer, now making two million and a half feet per day.

This amount of gas added to the amount they already have in the field assures them of enough gas to supply this city for almost an indefinite period of time.
