next Monday.

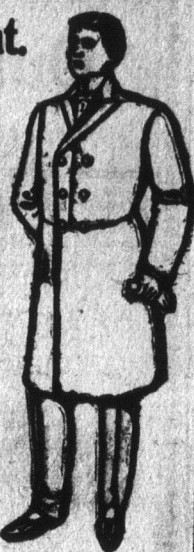
Mrs. Morrison, of Detroit, has re-
