Carleton-Victoria Delegates

to those sorrowing for and bereaved of dear ones who have made the supreme sacrifice for the maintenance of Christian liberty and all the principles that the British flag stands for and in recognition of their irreparable loss we would convey our sympathy and condolence and we wish to further express and give our assurance of substantial support to the young men who have been maimed and injured in the war.

These resolutions were adopted and made unanimous.

Hon. W. P. Jones then addressed the meeting with great acceptance. His remarks on the grand old Liberal policies and the place occupied by the late lamented leader, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and the part played by this country in the war and our responsibilities and duties to the returned soldiers and our country fairly carried the audience off their feet.

The report of the nominating committee was received as follows: Delegates to Ottawa—James Burgess, Dr. F. W. Griffin, Albion R. Foster; substitutes, Frank Gillespie, John T. Fleming, Chas. F. Gallagher.

It was moved by James Porter, seconded by J. F. Tweeddale that the reports be received and approved unanimously. This was carried and the meeting adjourned.

Aberdeen S. S. Convention

The Sunday School Convention for the Parish of Aberdeen was held at Argyle on July 14. The meeting was opened by Rev. Mr. Pentz. After Scripture and prayer, E. Carey, county president, took the chair in the absence of the parish president.

A paper on Missions was read by Mrs. S. S. Miller, after which followed remarks on Sunday school work by Mr. Carey. Rev. J. W. Brown of Fort Fairfield addressed the meeting on the departmental work and charted the schools of Aberdeen. Only three schools, East Glassville, Glassville and Argyle have four classes. Glassville has a cradle roll besides the classes. He gave them divisions as follows: cradle roll, up to three years; beginners 4-5 years; primary 6-8; junior 9-11; young people's division (younger boys and girls) 12-14; young people's division (older boys and girls) 15 to 17; young people's department 17-24; adult, 24-80. There are also administration departments for graduates, etc., educational, including teacher training, temperance and missions.

Dr. Brown urged upon the Sunday schools the importance of the decisions for Christ.

There was a discussion on temperance and cigarettes. He advised every boy to read "The White Slave" by Henry Ford and see the deadly evil of cigarettes.

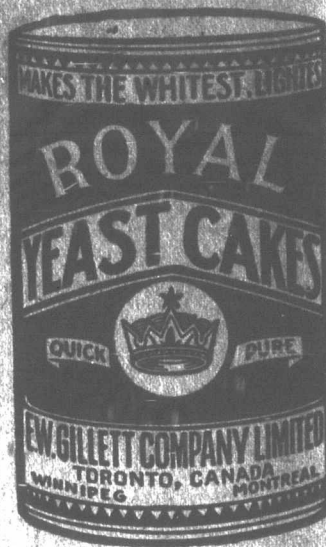
Sanford Rogers

Sanford Rogers who died at Fort Fairfield on June 10, was formerly a resident of Bristol, where he was born, a son of the late Jeanette Bell and Moody Rogers, 63 years ago. He was twice married, his first wife being Maria Wood, who died 26 years ago. Five children survive this union—Mrs. O. S. Higgins and Mrs. Lowell Burtchell of Fort Fairfield, James and Frank in British Columbia and John in California. Mr. Rogers was married in 1895 to Mary Jane Munkler of Grand Falls, who survives him. Of this union there are also seven children, all living at Fort Fairfield, except the youngest, a little girl of five who was killed in an automobile accident on April 23. There are six brothers—David, Duncan, John and Theodore of Bristol, Weyman and Archie of Boston, and one sister, Mrs. Harry Lipscomb of Hartland.

Mr. Rogers went to New Hampshire about 20 years ago, and during the past 11 years has made his home in Fort Fairfield, being employed by Hopkins Bros. On May 30 he was injured by a pile of lumber falling on him, and died from the effects. He was a man held in high esteem in his community.

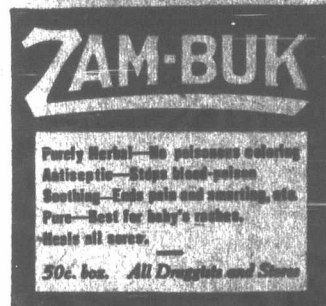
