GENERAL NEWS.

John G. Whitler will celebrate his

eighteenth birthday on the 17th

of next month.

The most Rev. John Power, the

Catholic Bishop of Waterford and

Lismore, Ireland, is dead.

A society has been formed in

St. John, N. B., to promote the due

observance of the Lord's Day.

Capt. Bauldry, of New Bedford,

this year killed thirty-five whales

and secured 2,800 barrels of oil and

48,000 pounds of bone.

The adjourned sittings of the

Supreme Court opened at Fredericton

on Tuesday last, heard arguments and

gave judgment in cases left over.

The consumption of cotton in

the United States is shown by statistics

to have increased from 601,-

200,000 pounds in 1876 to 911,200-

000 pounds in 1886.

The Canadian Pacific intend

doubling their freight rolling stock

and purpose building, between this

and the end of next year, 4,000 box

cars and 200 locomotives.

The largest output of coal ever

2,683 tons.
