TWO READINGS

DUNDAS NEW HIGH SCHOOL WILL SOON BE BUILT.

Town Council Decides to Drop the Appeal in the Cummings Case, and Pay the Damages and Costs.

Dundas, April 28.-A special meeting of the Town Council was held last evening, all the members being present but Councillor Brannigan. A petition was presented by 324 freeholders of the town asking that \$16,000 be provided for the erection of a high school building on the present site. One-half the number of freeholders on the voters' list, including absentees, and a others' marvisleble. absentees and others unavailable, amounts to 330. The Finance Commit-tee recommended granting the request,

the recommended granting the request, and a by-law for the purpose was given two readings, and will be put through its final stages at the regular meeting on Monday evening next. Debentures, 20 years to run, will be issued to raise the money. The Mayor, Reeve and Councillors Bertram and Lunn were appointed a committee for transferring the present high school portion of the buildings to public school use.

Petitions for street watering were presented, and a bylaw was passed providing for watering Main street from the cotton mill bridge to King street; King street from York street to Fisher's paper mills, and Cross street from King to Park street. The watering will continue until the 18th of November, and will be done by the corporation team, will be done by the corporation team, and will be paid for by a special levy on real estate along the streets water-ed. The work will cost \$4 per day, any time not over two hours to count as a

ed. The work will cost \$4 per day, any time not over two hours to count as a quarter day, and any time over two hours to count half a day, and forenoon or afternoon. Petitions for watering Sydenham and Oglivie streets were not granted, as the required number of signatures were not obtained.

The Fire and Water Committee was voted \$35 to finish the bath room now under construction in the fire hall.

The Mayor was given authority to furnish uniforms for the police, in addition to that provided for in the by-law, as he may deem proper.

Acting on the recommendations of the Finance Committee and the town solicitor, the council decided to drop the appeal in the Cummings case, and pay the claim, as follows: Damages awarded, \$207.20; taxed costs, \$148.21; total costs, \$355.41.

The town clerk was instructed to secure information from other towns of from 3,000 to 5,000 regarding their police systems.
