Application of Harvester Company Was Refused.

At Toronto yesterday, before Muirhead, C. P., Magee, J. and Clute, J., in Small vs. Claffin, H. H. Bicknell, for the defendants, appealed from the judgment of Anglin, J., of Dec. 2, 1908; J. L. Counsell, for plaintiff, contra. Plaintiff, a theatre owner of Toronto, entered into an agreement with defendant, theatre builders, for the reconstruction of the Grand Opera House, Hamilton, and alleged a breach of said agreement by defendants, whereby he was obliged to pay out \$10,000, or thereabouts, to complete the work undertaken by defendants, and in addition suffered damages by reason of delay of one month in completion, and he claimed \$15,000 damages. The defendants contended that owing to extensive changes not contemplated when the agreement was drawn, they were entitled to extra compensation, and they counter-claimed for \$500 and commission on \$12,500, being additional costs of reconstruction, \$1,250. At the trial judgment was given for the plaintiff for \$8,730, with costs of action and counter claim. Defendants appeal from that judgment. Argument resumed from yesterday, and after partial hearing was adjourned until Friday next to enable counsel to obtain information as to whether or not the drawings cover the buildings in question, and as to whether the same should not be referred to the court. They may be made to do so.

TWO APPEALS.

In the Court of Appeal, before Ooster, C. J. O., in Fisher vs. International Harvester Company, J. W. Nesbitt, K. C., for defendants, moved on Feb. 23rd for leave to appeal from the judgment of a divisional court, whereby they reversed the judgment of Riddell, J., dismissing the action, and gave judgment for the plaintiff for \$1,000 and costs; G. Lynch-Staunton, K. C., for the plaintiff, contra. The application was refused, with costs.

SMUGGLED JEWELRY.

Two Montreal Firms Sued by Government for Heavy Penalties. Montreal, March 9.—The case of the Damascene Jewelry Co., being used by the Government for penalties up to \$15,000, and Margill Lawande, \$20,000, for alleged smuggling from New York State, began to-day before Judge Casels. An ex-employee named Canfor swore that he had been employed by the jewelry firm to smuggle goods into Canada. He had the goods sent to him at Lisbon, N. Y., opposite Iroquois, Ont, after which he would bring them over to his home in Iroquois at night, later on shipping them to the firm in Montreal.

Fell Off Bridge and Killed.
