R. N. Weeks Dead at Millerton. The many friends of R. N. Weeks were shocked on Wednesday last to learn of his death, which occurred at his home in Millerton about two o'clock in the afternoon, aged 65 years.

Deceased had been taken suddenly ill while on a visit to his old home in Alberton, P. E. I., and returned home about two weeks ago. It was thought that his condition was serious until early last week, when he began to lose strength.

The late Mr. Weeks was well and favorably known on the Miramichi, having also resided in Newcastle for a number of years. While here he was employed in Park's general store, and after they had sold out he moved to Millerton, where he opened a general store, and enjoyed a successful business until the time of his illness.

He was an active citizen, being prominent in church and temperance work. For years was a respected elder in the Presbyterian church, being ordained to the eldership in 1883. He is survived by his wife, formerly Miss McLellan of Newcastle, one daughter, Miss Adelaide at home, one son, Wendell, at the front with the Canadian forces, also a brother, Mr. William Weeks, and a sister, Mrs. Henry J. Matthews, both of Alberton, P. E. I.

The funeral services which were held on Friday afternoon, from his late residence were conducted by Rev. A. Rettie, assisted by Rev. S. J. Macarthur. The Foresters, of which Order the deceased was an esteemed member, took charge at the grave.

Deceased was seventy-nine years of age and is survived by four sons—James, of Wisconsin; John, of Arona, Conn.; Harvey and William of Wayerton; and three daughters—Mrs. Dr. Alvin Leavitt, New York; Mrs. Dr. Charles Carden, Wayerton, Mass., and Miss Rose Urquhart of New York. Two brothers also survive—R. H. Urquhart of California and Alexander of Marquette. The funeral took place on Friday at one o'clock.

France Calls 400,000 More Men to Colors

Paris, Sept. 17—France says there are no prospects of an early peace, despite the mounting cost of the war.

By passing today the Government's bill calling 400,000 more of her sons to the colors, parliament will serve notice on Germany that this is to be a fight to the finish.

Government officials, members of the Chamber of Deputies and leaders in the public life of France, today gave hearty indorsement to a speech of Premier Assoluth in the British House of Commons on Wednesday. Premier Assoluth's view that this world war is a gigantic battle of resources finds approval here. Recent developments including Germany's failure to rush the Russian army, convinced the French that the tide is about to turn.

The class of 1917, summoned to training by the provisions of the bill the chamber is expected to pass today, cannot reach the trenches before next May or June at the earliest, indicating the belief in official circles that the war will last at least another year.

Though it was stated in parliament that five months' training will be required for these 18 year old youths, it is generally understood that their drill will extend over a long period and that they probably will not be called upon to face fire for nearly a year.

The provision in the Government bill ordering 47 year old men of the class of 1888 to hold themselves in readiness for service was only a precautionary measure. This class would have been mustered out of service next month and be no longer eligible for duty. The provisions in the Government bill holds them liable for service in case of great emergency.
