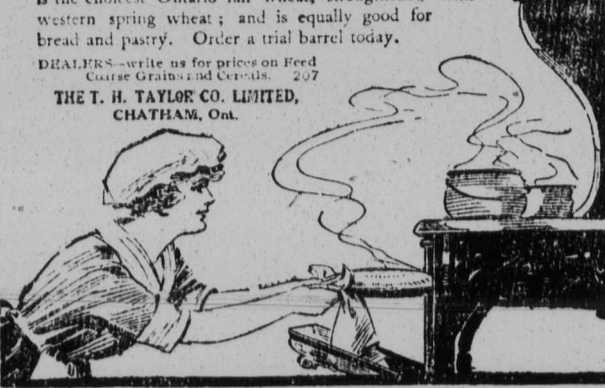

Winnipeg Hears Of Outside Reports

St. Paul, Minn., May 21—(Special from J. F. B. Livesay, Canadian Press Correspondent)—Passengers arriving in Winnipeg today from eastern Canada points first made the people of Winnipeg acquainted with reports more circulated to the effect that a Soviet revolution was in control of the city, that the "red flag" flew on the City Hall, that banks had closed their doors, and so on.

All these reports are entirely without foundation, except that a number of restaurants are closed. Life is pretty much as usual, barring absence of street cars and horse vehicles on the streets. The visitor is struck above all by the absence of excitement and disorder. Were it not that the stores are open, it might be a public holiday, with good-natured crowds lining the sidewalks, waiting for a procession.

Seen at the City Hall this afternoon Mayor Gray said: "The condition of the streets show that absolutely law and order is being maintained by the police force and it will be maintained. Food supplies are being well taken care of, and there is no shortage in the hospitals or the home. The fight between employers and employees must be settled by themselves. As long as the city maintains law and order and sufficient food supplies, it is doing all that it is called upon to do, but if we can at any time act as mediators between the opposing parties we are here to do so. The objection cards on the bread or milk wagons and theatres saying 'by commission of the strike committee have been taken down and will not be allowed to appear again. Give this message to the people of Canada as coming from the mayor of Winnipeg, a peace-loving citizen of this town, and the British flag is flying from the top of the City Hall and has been flying ever since."

Germans Given Seven Days Extension

(Canadian Press)

Paris, May 21—The German peace delegation has been granted an extension of seven days, or until May 29, in which to reply in full to the peace terms, according to an official announcement.

New York, May 21—The Associated Press tonight issues the following: A period of seven days' grace has been extended in Germany by the representatives of the Entente and associated governments in effecting the German peace plenipotentiaries may recede their study of the peace treaty and formulate such replies to the various clauses as they desire.

The extension of time, which originally was to have expired at noon Thursday, was granted at the request of the Germans who advanced the plea that more time was required in order that they might formulate arguments of such importance and length that were the original draft adhered to it would be impossible to complete them. Thus the time has been set for Thursday, May 29. Efforts made in Germany to ascertain even the gist of the contents of the proposed reply of Germany have been without reward. Report has it, however, that lengthy notes dealing with Alsace-Lorraine, the East German frontier, the territory occupied by the Allied forces, and the amount of the indemnity and the method of its payment are to be dealt with.

Almost simultaneously with the request by the peace plenipotentiaries for more time comes from Berlin a statement of the German Cabinet that Germany is unwilling to sign the peace treaty. The document is a reiteration, although in stronger words, of the views of the to-morrow statesmen in Germany that the signing of the treaty would spell the ruin of the former empire.

The old proposal that setting the document in its hands would involve dishonor and moral degradation of the country is adhered to.
