Biennal Legislation
From recent cosrespondence in th columns of some of our metropolitan
ontemporaries, it would appear tha he abovermentioned subject, is just now being brought upon the "tapis,
with a view to the consideration of its applicability or otherwise, to th The arguments advanced on both
ides, though conflicting, are stil pretty forcible and conclusive in issue, but in our opinion the ar ments of the opponents of the chang vocates, more especially as to the er public interests, from the obstacle presented to investigation of the pub
lic expenditure, by representative who from time to time may hav causes of complaint, real or imagi nary, in the respect referred to. No
lone with respect to the considera ion last mentioned would such change, in our opinion, be open od referred to, various matters paramourt importance to the fub io interests might transpire, which us and attentive consideration of th Legislative wisdom of the colony be fore governmental action being tak en thereons. Were an Executive, no
matter how worthy of public confi ence,entrusted with a 'carte blanche as regards the public interests gem-
eraliy, for so long a period, continraliy, for so long a period, contin
ensies. might at any time arise whereby an expenditure might b ncurred, far in excess of what migh
be deemed necessary upon careful onsideration and investigation b the Legislature. Viewing the sub stitution of the proposed biennal for
our present annual system of legis. ation upon general grounds, we cerainly are of opinion, that in addition to the more than probable neglec
and injury to the public interests fyom such a change, increased ex penditure and loss to the public rey nue, rather than economy, would, in our opinion be the probable result. If economy be desirable in. connec ion with the legislative inscitution of this colony why not revise the pre,
sent Representation Act and reduce the number of representatives by on ourse pursued, with a due regard to
our population, we have every con dence that the change would be at-
tended with results far more satisfa tory to the general interests than b the substitution of the biennial fo
our present system of legislation.

## Past Season's Results

The results of the past season's operations in connection with the prosecution of our stapleindustry, though
upon the whole satisfactory, have not been so remunerative to our o erative population as would have
been expected from the large amoun been expected from the large amount
of fish taken, especially on the Labador coast during the period referred to, This great drawback, which may be principally attributed to the low price of fish in Foreign markets, in high prices of provisions, will doubt less, to a considerable extent, be pro
ductive of much inconvenience dur: ing the coming winter, more particu attention has been devoted to the prosecution of the shore fishery
during the past season, which, in many places, has not been attended
with results by any means as satis factory as that abovementioned
Another, and by no meaus unimportant source of regret in connection
with the past summer's fishery Labrador coast, is the deficiency in the catch of herring, which, owing
to the scarcity of that fish and the unusually rough weather prevalent during the season, is far short of that
of last year. The success attendan upon enterprise in the Bank fish
ery, has during the past season bee far more general in its results then
for years provious, our local bankers being equally fortunate with theis American and Provincial neighbor
engaged in the same enterprise and is most earnestly to be hoped tha
the increased outfit from this colony for this last mentioned, though no
least important branch of our fisher es, in the ensuing spring, will be near future to this most valuable fish ery, on a seale of equal magnitud
and importance to that of the past.
