That Famous Trip.

An Irishman once said, "There is one thing I am not sure of." On being asked what it was, he replied, "I am not sure I have to die."

If he had been such a man as was Ellish or Enoch, he might have had some grounds for his belief, but being of the earth "Earthy," it was absolutely out of place that he should have contemplated such a "finish."

This introduction may not be to the point, but it shows how far one may be out in his ideas, and how very like the unexpected it is to happen.

The evening of the 13th was a most disagreeable one, but long before the scheduled hour for the departure of the train, pupils from both B. F. C. and M. C. crowded into the Depot in such numbers that the place was literally alive with faces that bore a marked contrast to the general aspect without.

Courts Decree.

MUKDEN, April 8.—An army officer named Cho attached at the Topographical Department of the Chinese Manchurian division headquarters at Changung, was discovered to have sold a number of important maps to the Japanese, realizing fifteen thousand taels. Cho was exiled in Japan and married a Japanese. The Vice-survey reported the case to the general staff at Peking, and recommended twenty years' imprisonment. DUBIOUS ABOUT ARBITRATION PLANS.

Would United States Submit Monroe Doctrine to Arbitration? Asks Sir E. R. Freeman.

London, April 10.—Admiral Sir E. R. Freeman, writing for a correspondence here, agrees that Anglo-American arbitration will probably tend toward solidarity of political influence between the two nations, but fears that the pacific will build on it the supposition that all war is a thing of the past.

"Supposing," he says, "that we even had an alliance, offensive and defensive, with America. The latter power has no army and could not materially help us in Europe. Even with the United States the question of an arbitration treaty is not a simple one. Would the President of the Republic submit the question of the Monroe Doctrine or of the fortification of the Panama canal, for instance, to arbitration."

Sounded Charge at Sebastopol.

Paris, April 8.—A French hero of the Crimean War has died here at the age of 78. This was M. Daudot, the famous bugler of a regiment of Zouaves, who immortalized himself at the final assault on Sebastopol. When the French stormed the Malakhoff, Daudot, Dubout, the Malakhoff, reformed, Daudot was among the first to reach the top of the bastion. Although he made an admirable target for the Russian riflemen, he stood there and sounded the charge again and again. He was among the handful of survivors of the first attacking lines and escaped, indeed, without a scratch. When the Tsar visited Chebourg two years ago he performed a graceful act in pinning the Russian military medal on Daudot's breast.
