OFFICIAL.

LONDON, March 25.
The Governor, Newfoundland:
The French Government reports progress by the Belgian Army on the Yser. Two German attacks were completely defeated north of Arras. Trenches were captured and prisoners taken at Hartmannswillerkopf. The Russian Government reports slow progress being made in desperate fighting on the right bank of the Narva. In the Carpathians the Russians are advancing. Over four thousand prisoners and many machine guns have been captured.

HARCOURT.

ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.

PARIS, via St. Pierre, March 25.
North of Arras, during the night of 23rd-24th, the Germans delivered two attacks on Notre Dame de Loreste spur. Their defeat was complete. In Champagne, on the same night, a German attack on Beauséjour Keep was repulsed.

According to a despatch from Athens to the London Daily Mail, the Allies have landed troops in the Isthmus of Gallipoli from the Gulf of Satoros.

A general attack on the Dardanelles will be made as soon as the French ships arrive.

A CONSTANTINOPLE STORY.

LONDON, March 25.
The Evening Chronicle publishes a despatch from Bucharest, Rumania, to the effect that the Turkish Government recently decided to surrender Constantinople and the Dardanelles to the Allied fleet. The surrender was all but arranged, the Chronicle says, when at the last moment it was blocked by Germany. The Peace Party forced a vote, at the recent cabinet meeting, to send emissaries, one of which was the American Ambassador Morgenthau, to the Dardanelles to negotiate with the commander of the Allied fleet for the surrender of Constantinople. Just as everything seemed settled, the German General, Liman Von Sanders heard of the plan and nipped it with the threat of the court-martial of all concerned.

U-29 SUNK WITH ALL HANDS.

LONDON, March 25.
The British Admiralty stated this evening that they thought the German submarine U-29, which recently sank four British and one French steamer in the English Channel and damaged three other vessels, had been sunk with all hands. Text of official statement said: "Admiralty have good reasons to believe that the German submarine U-29 has been sunk with all hands."

WILLING TO TAKE MEN'S PLACES.

LONDON, March 25.
Women are crowding to register for employment at the Labor Exchange here and throughout England at the rate of 150,000 per day. It is estimated already one million women have shown themselves ready to fill positions now occupied by men, if men still go into the army. The Government has expressed its approval of this movement, but no definite action has been taken. However, women are now being employed as clerks in the Censor's office and elsewhere in Government work that formerly was occupied by men. All railways and tramways throughout England have received letters from the Government, asking them to do all they can to employ women and release able-bodied men for fighting.

THE KARLSRUHE AGAIN.

NEW YORK, March 25.
German naval officers at Bremerhaven are quoted as authority for the statement that the cruiser Karlsruhe lies at the bottom of the sea in the West Indies. Jesse Boyd, second officer of the American steamer Carib, that was sunk by a mine in the North Sea, who reached here to-day from Rotterdam, says that he spent five days at Bremerhaven, and through an old-time friend, now an officer in the German navy, obtained positive confirmation of the rumor that the Karlsruhe was no longer afloat. Boyd quotes his friend as saying that a German bomb sent her to the bottom after she had struck on a reef. Some of her crew are now at Bremerhaven; others somewhere probably in the West Indies or in South America.

The Ice Blockade.

The continuous ice blockade around this port in consequence of the prevailing easterly and north easterly winds for the past month or so has been and is a great impediment to shipping. Several foreign going vessels, laden with fish, were held up in port here during the last few weeks for a fortnight and more on account of being unable to negotiate the ice while a number of vessels enroute to St. John's from foreign ports, are on our coast, this long while awaiting a strong change of wind to drive the ice off. Only last week the Furness boat Graciana got away from here for Halifax, after being detained for eight days longer than was necessary. At present the Durango and Tobasco, bound for Liverpool and Halifax, respectively, are tied up at the Furness Line pier and are now three days icebound. No doubt this season's ice blockade is one of the worst in the history of the country.

Star Lecture.

Mr. H. F. Shortis lectured to a large gathering of members of the Star of the Sea Society and their friends at the Star Hall last night. The subject of the discourse was: "Sketches of Early Fishing Days" which was dealt with in a most interesting manner. The manners and customs of the old time settlers, their methods of prosecuting the fisheries and the early teaching in the schools, were described in Mr. Shortis' usual style.
