MAKE BREATHING EASY.

Death for Toys.

Mechanics Magazine.

Oct. 23.—Several thou-
sands of German-made toys arriv-
ing to-day.—Associated Press.

Who? For the innocents
down when the Lusitania
for those tear-eyed Belgian
who stretch forth little arms
which the hands were struck off
the swends of German officers?

French boys and girls with
their eyes? For those
little bellies rest in the church-
yard of Italy, that died in pain from
Hans candy? For those oth-
ers slowly starved to death in
the massacres in Armenia?

For those made by Huns to whom
childhood are but toys
played with and then crushed
beneath? Toys whose very con-
struction and leaves upon the

touch of babyhood invisible dots of
blood? As well bring a deadly ger-
ment into the home to spew its venom
on the cradle. Why shall we befool
and taint the purity of American
childhood with a reminder of the
fendish treatment the Huns have
gloried in ever since that fateful Aug-
ust of 1914? Can one even look upon
a Noah's Ark "Made in Germany" and
put from his mind those hundreds of
helpless innocents whose silken locks
are twined with seaweed? Can one
hold a German doll in her arms and
forget the thousands dead from fam-
ine who once made glad a mother's
arms? Can a boy find delight in the
contortions of a mechanical Hun
clown and forget those brave young
men who writhed in agony when
crucified on castle walls by these
same Huns? Can a ball colored with
the red of Huns fail to suggest the
flame from bursting grenades hurled
by arms uplifted in the attitude of
"kamerad?"

Let those who would invite fear-
some ghosts into the home to hover
round the Christmas tree buy German
toys. If one would hang the boughs
with evil omens, and bid the wall of
agonized spirits float through the
branches and fan the flickering flame
of candles, let him buy German toys.
Let those who can, make merry with
the product of those very hands
which even at this moment are easi-
ly filling shells with poison gases and
deadly flames and hurling them
against our own flesh and blood.

And what of the merchant who for
sordid gain would barter these sou-
venirs of a loathsome nation and in-
sult the loyalty of his lips? What
could more delight the cunning Hun,
what more quickly bring the sinister
smile to cruel faces, or gladden
heartless hearts, or encourage him to
hope that even now we tolerate his
brutality and welcome what he wants
to sell? If now, when as a nation we
are in universal condemnation of
Hunism, yet do we hold out our hands
to accept his works, what will he
think and with what measure shall he
estimate the sincerity of our expres-
sions of repugnance and horror at
what he has done since the sun rose
this morning? What mitigation can
we claim in the thought that America
was not yet overseas when these tin-
kets were fashioned? Even while the
guady paint was yet fresh upon these
trinkets were Belgian girls being

dragged into slavery worse than
death.

We do not lack for toys; toys
by trainloads made in American fac-
tories, by hands which are clean; toys
also by carloads made by our ally in
Japan, where childhood is sacred, and
love not hate, is taught at mother's
breasts. Even were there none, far
better our boys and girls should go
without than find pleasure in the han-
dwork of a nation which made a pub-
lic holiday to celebrate the loss of the
Lusitania, and which in these latter
days is steeped in the "glory" of mon-
strosities. Could our little men who
sacrifice many a childish pleasure to
buy war stamps and contribute pen-
nies to the Red Cross, and our little
mothers who knit so patiently with
hands that can barely hold the
needles, would one of these knowingly
find any pleasure in any toy "Made in
Germany?"

Killed in Action.

foundland as its victim in the per-
son of Stephen Taylor, formerly of
Carbonear.

Stephen was the son of the late Wm.
Taylor, of Rock Hill, Carbonear. He
emigrated to the United States about
twenty years ago, and about a year

strong he volunteered and by virtue of
his loyalty has given his all for King
and Country.

Bureau Veritas.

Congratulations to Mr. W. E. Lad-
ley, Superintendent of Motive Power,
Rail Newfoundland Company, who
has recently received the appointment
of Newfoundland Surveyor to the Bu-
reau Veritas, Paris. Bureau Veritas is
styled The French Lloyds, and is an
institution for the classification of
vessels on principles similar to
Lloyds. It was founded at Antwerp
in 1828 and in 1830 removed to Paris,
from whence in 1870 its head office
was taken to Brussels. During the
war Paris was again the location of
the central establishment. Bureau
Veritas has sub-offices in every prin-
cipal seaport and we think that sev-
eral Newfoundland vessels have been
entered upon its register. The position
of surveyor to the institution is a
very important and responsible of-
fice, and Mr. Ladley is the right man
in the right place.

Supreme Court.

In Chambers, Before Mr. Justice
Johnson.

C. Parsons and Sons, Ltd. vs. Arch-
bald Bros., Ltd.—This is an applica-
tion on the part of the defendants for
an order (1) That the reply be struck
out on the ground that it discloses no
reasonable cause of answer and that
judgment be delivered for defendant
in the counter-claim, or that (2) a
further and better statement of the
nature of the defence to the counter-
claim, and further and better particu-
lars of paragraph 3 thereof be given;
and for the costs of this application.
Morine, K.C., was heard in support of
application. Adjourned until Wed-
nesday, 27th.

Margaret Guilfoyle, Admstr., estate
of Peter Guilfoyle, vs. The New York
Haltax and Nfld. S. S. Co.—This is
an application to strike out certain
paragraphs of the defence on the
grounds that they tend to prejudice
the fair trial of the action. Mr. Mc-
Nelly was heard in support of the ap-
plication, and Mr. Warren, K.C., was
heard contra. The Court took time to
consider.
