### Civic Commission.

WEEKLY MEETING.

The Weekly Meeting of the Municipal Commission was held Thursday last. Commissioner Morris presided; Commissioners Ayre, Peet, Jackman and Vinicombe were present.

The Minutes of the previous meeting were read, after which Commissioner Ayre referred to the sudden passing of the wife of the Deputy Mayor, which occurred within the past few days, and moved the Council place on record its sympathy with the Deputy Mayor in his great sorrow.

A communication was read from the Colonial Secretary, stating that guarantee had been forwarded the Royal Bank of Canada for the loan required

bank of Canada for the foan required by the Municipality.

Manager Jübien of the Royal Bank of Canada informed the Council the loan required for Water and Sewerage extensions was now available. The Auditor General wrote re pipes supplied the Council for water extension to Poor Aslyum, which, he under-stood, would be a charge against Council. The pipes in question were given for the purpose of adequate water supply to the Asylum, in case of fire. An arrangement was entered into between the Prime Minister and the Council, whereby the Government were to supply the pipes and the Council of the pressary trenching. cil to do the necessary trenching, pipe-laying and back-filling.

Application of the Royal Bank of Canada for water and sewer connec-tions to new Bank Building will be at-tended to.


