The Council met on Monday night. All the members present, the Mayor in the chair. The Clerk read a communication from J. Hart, in which he stated that the work of cleaning out the river was finished, and requested that it be inspected Mr Holliday read a petition from Henry Boulton, prayings to be relieved from taxes. Referred to Finance Committee. Mr. McCurry read a petition from Wm Bookless, praying for transfer of license from Mr. O'Neil to him.

Mr. Robt. Mitchell presented a petition from Richard McCruden, praying the Council to grant him a certificate in order that he might procure a license for the Bullfrog Tavern.

Mr. Chadwick presented the report of the Finance Committee, which was as follows:

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT.

The Finance Committee beg to report that they have considered the various potitions referred to them, and recommend that \$8.88 be refunded to Messrs. Mills & a Melvin, for taxes paid by them on lots 90 a and 91, Guelph, for 1862, the same having also been paid by the Canada Company. That the amounts required to redeem the lots mentioned in the petitions of W. S. & Knowles, C. Horning, J. McKee, and J. T. Leslie be paid, said lots having been incorrectly sold. That the amount paid by the Mechanics' Institute for use of Town Hall for a course of lectures by Dr. Howitt, for five nights, not so used, be refunded. That the accounts of J. B. Thornton, and C. W. Chewett for blanks be paid. That no action be taken in the case of James Perry, the collector having returned "no effects," against the occupant Knox. That the Clerk do procure a copy of the Statutes for 1868-69, for each member of Council. They further report that the Court of Revision duly held their sittings as advertised, and having made a few alterations, passed and confirmed the assessment roll of 1869.—Adopted.

### McLeod, Wood & Co's Melodeon Fac-

This establishment gives evidence of prosperity, if the employment of a large number of hands and the turning out of a very considerable amount of work can be considered as testimony. The factory in the old Advertiser Office is large and commodious, and none but efficient workmen are employed. Fifteen men are distributed in ten departments, and as each attends to his own work, and nothing else, there is a certainty of the whole being well performed. The proprietors inforta us that orders are coming in faster than they can be filled, and that fresh hands may find an engagement. The departments are the case-room, action-room, polishing, varnishing, trimming, turning, packing and warerooms. All the wood used is placed within the influence of the heat of a stove for a considerable time previous to its being worked up,so that there remains no possibility of its shrinkage afterwards. The matching of the veneering material is a job that requires great caution, as the patterns of the rosewood are so frequently widely dissimilar. Were this not carefully attended to, as it always is by one of the proprietors, the external appearance of the instruments would look like very bad painting. From the time the case leaves the case-room until the instrument is ready for boxing up twelve weeks at least must elapse, so slow is the progress of melodeon making. The establishment make their own keys, engraving and everything belonging to the instruments they manufacture with the exception of the reeds. They finish about seven per week, most of which are sent to agents who have ordered them, although a considerable retail trade is done in the town. One melodeon and three organs, intended for the Exhibition at London, are progressing towards completion. One of the organs is very large, and has been purchased by the Brantford Choral Union. ### **GREAT BRITAIN**

LÖNDON, June 21.— The announcement of the sudden death of Henry J. Raymond, which was received here by the cable on Saturday creates a deep feeling of sorrow. The papers eulogize Mr. Raymand, and say his death creates a gap which can't be filed.

In the House of Commons this evening Sir John Gray, member for Kilkenny, asked the Government if there was any reason to apprehend further troubles in Ireland, and if the military force in that country was to be strengthened.

Mr. Fortescue, Chief Secretary of Ireland, stated that the Government was informed that Mr. Johnston, a prominent leader in Ireland, had called a meeting to celebrate the anniversary of the 12th of July. This was not an act of hostlity to the Government, but the practice of lincreasing the military force of Ireland about the time of this anniversary was an ever more necessary than in the present.
