County Judge's Criminal Court.

The QUEEN vs. JOHN JOHNSTON.—The prisoner was placed upon trial for having, on the evening of the 23rd Dec. last, stolen from the store of Messrs. Ferguson & Scott, of Arthur Village, certain articles consisting of a lady's fur tipper, two muffs, a quantity of red flannel, and other small articles.

Other witnesses were called, and although all believed that the goods found in prisoner's possession were the identical articles taken, yet none of them were positive on that point.

Prisoner's counsel submitted that as none of the witnesses proved the identity of the goods, and as Johnston was not produced to show if he had missed them when taking them in, the prisoner could not be convicted.

Immediately after the prisoner was placed on trial on another charge, viz:—One Mr. O'Neil of Arthur, charged prisoner with stealing a certain machine used by framers for the purpose of boring timber.

It appears that a part of the missing instrument was taken to the shop of Mr. Kinfield for sale as old iron, by a woman residing with the prisoner.

His Honor intimated that if prisoner were with her should part with the woman, or she with him. He did not, as in the other case, consider the evidence sufficient, and therefore dismissed prisoner with an earnest caution to not be charged again.
