THE WEATHER PROPHECY.

TORONTO, Oct. 8—11 p.m.—The storm
centered with great rapidity from the coast
of North Carolina to the Gulf of St. Lawrence,
absorbing in its passage the depression which
gave rain in the lakes yesterday, and causing
a heavy rain, with moderate gales in the Gulf
of St. Lawrence and Maritime Provinces. To-
night the pressure is highest over the Western
States, and is decreasing over our Northwest
Territories where the weather has turned de-
cidedly warmer.

Calgary, 30°-35°; Edmonton, 25°-30°; Prince
Albert, 28°-34°; Qu'Appelle, 40°-50°; Winnipeg,
30°-35°; Toronto, 47°-57°; Montreal, 42°-46°;

Local temperatures—Highest, 57°; lowest, 44°.

on the same evening. On the Erie
and Huron Railway excursion rates will be
granted on Oct. 13 from all stations between
Chatham and Sarnia. This will afford
a splendid opportunity for the general pub-
lic to visit Sarnia on the above date,
as there are many interesting attractions
there, such as the tunnel, etc., apart from
the political demonstration.

THE MORMON CONFERENCE
Solemnly Declares That the Practice of
Polygamy is a Crime.

SALT LAKE, U. T., Oct. 8.—At yester-
day's session of the Mormon conference a
lengthy set of resolutions were adopted
relative to the statement made by a major-
ity of the Utah Commission in a recent re-
port to the Secretary of the Interior. The
resolutions set forth that the commission
made many untruthful statements concern-
ing the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day
Saints, and the attitude of its mem-
bers in relation to political affairs, etc.

The resolutions further declare that the
members of the conference don't believe
that there have been any polygamous mar-
riages solemnized among the Latter Day
Saints during the period named by the
commission, and denounce the statements
which convey the idea that such marriages
have been contracted as false and mis-
leading.

Following this a declaration, signed by
President Woodruff, George Q. Cannon and
Joseph F. Smith was adopted, saying the
commissions' reports of polygamous
marriages were utterly without foundation
in truth, and it was in the most solemn
manner declared by President Woodruff at
the last general conference that there had
been no plural marriages during the period
named; that polygamy had not been taught
and its practice had been strictly forbidden.
