Western Chtarlo Art School.

The Government School of Art will reopen on Monday in the Mechanics' Institute building, Dundas street. This school has an established reputation. In class 97 at the Western Fair, open to pupils of art schools, ladies' colleges, academies of paintings, collegiate institutes, high and common schools, this school carried off a total of 37 prizes. There were fourteen sections laid out for competition, and pupils of this art school were awarded first prize in each, besides four second prizes. This must have been especially gratifying to the instructors and directors. At a meeting of the directors held on Tuesday Mr. J. H. Griffiths was appointed principal. It is proposed to have a public exhibition of the work of the students some time about the middle of January, and we understand that a considerable number of the works shown will be exhibited at the World's Fair next summer. FOUND DROWNED.

The following dispatch from Port Stanley was received this afternoon: "A man found drowned on New Orchard Beach here, about 70 years of age, six feet in height, weighs about 165 pounds, grav wriskers, no mustache, gray hair, dark striped cottonade pants, laced shoes, tight fitting jacket and vest of black satin cloth, wearing a leather belt, supposed to have been in the water some days and supposed to be the resired farmer missing from Mrs. Murray's boarding house, London." The above description tallies exactly with that of James Potter, the old man who disappeared from Mrs. Mary Murray's boarding house on Wellington street last Thursday morning.
