

TOPICS' OF TO-DAY.

Three of the most notable points for the production of petroleum outside of North America are Baku, in the Caucasus; a Chinese pistrict about Banjowangie, where twelve wells have been sunk by a Chinese company, and Djahbakkoto, in the Island of Java, exploited by the Dortsche Petro-leum Company.
