Annual Meeting of the Independent Order's High Court.

The Reports Show a Satisfactory State of Affairs.

Those of the High Chief Ranger, Secretary and Treasurer-Membership Rapidly Growing.

PETERBORO, Aug. 14 .- The High Court of the Independent Order of Foresters opened its annual session here today with a splendid attendance of delegates. Following is a summary of the annual reports presented:

THE H. C. R.'S REPORT. Rev. Alex. McGillivray, the high chief ranger, presented a lengthy report, which gave a full account of the order's work during the year just closed. It showed everything in the various departments of work in a flourishing condition. The total membership was placed at 65,000 and the surplus at over \$1,000,000. In Outario the spending his vacation with relatives in membership was upwards of \$25,000. For the twelve months ending June 30, 6,394 applications had been received, of whom 5,855 passed the medical board, which exceeded any preceding year in the society's history by 1,029. There were at present 70 times as many members as at the end of

1881, the increase year by year being: Year. Courts. Members Year.

The P. H. C. R. had been engaged during almost the entire year in extending the order in Indiana. The H. V. C. R. had proved himself an able colleague, and the high treasurer, though a busy man, had responded to every call made upon him, and in addition to the duties of his office did acceptable and valuable outside work. The high secretary, high physician and high counselor were equally lauded.

Mr. McGillivray gave an exhaustive account of the work performed by the deputies, high inspectors and organizers. Sixty-three new courts had been instituted, The Misses Beulah, Grace and Josephine making the total in Ontario 582. The there was nothing to cause anxiety. Court had also been paid \$3,000 for supplies. The revenue for the year, exclusive of the loan was \$14,910 24, an advance of \$2,240 over the preceding twelve months. The amount available in the treasury was \$1,627 56, while about \$6,500 would be necessary to defray the expenses of this High Court. The number of deaths Mr. George M. purposes. HIGH SECRETARY'S REPORT. James B. Halkett, the high secretary for ten years past, acknowledged the uniform courtesy and kindness shown him by the supreme chief ranger, the G. O. M. of the order and his colleagues. The muster roll on July 1, 1893, showed 21,145. Since then there were 5,381 initiations, which, deducting 1,349 initiations and 111 deaths, made the membership on June 30, 1894, 25,066. There had been paid by courts for dues \$10,264 43, supplies \$3,814 02, with \$1,020 28 in dues still unpaid. The assets amounted to \$4,723 34. The liabilities exceed the assets by \$3,637 07, being \$8,-360 41. The amount due the Supreme Court is \$3,132 87; due C. C. Whale, \$152 75; borrowed from Supreme Court and others to defray traveling expenses of representatives to High Court, \$3,500; balance, Supreme Court, July 1, 1893, \$1,500. THE TREASURER'S FIGURES. Atwell Fleming, of London, High Court treasurer, presented the financial position. The receipts for the twelve months were \$18,530 77, of which \$3,500 was borrowed. The disbursements included the 'usual officers' expenses and salaries, making a total of \$18,123, and leaving a balance of \$406 95.

THE INSPECTORS. Messrs. C. C. Whale and R. R. Elliot. reviewed their work and cited several cases in which courts were badly in need of instruction. They had every reason to believe that the work of the year was satisfactory, and that nothing but success was in store for the I. O. F.
