Montreal, April 9.-At the monthly meeting of the Licensed Victualers' Association, a letter was read from Hiram Walker & Sons, the Walkerville distillers, declining to become members of the society. The letter created great indignation among the members, who had expected hearty assistance from that firm in procuring a Government license for the sale of spirits. A resolution was proposed that the society adopt retaliatory measures against the Walkers.

The Notes Ignored.

Greece Takes Little Stock in the "Concert" of the Powers.

Arrival of 700 More British Troops at Crete.

The Admirals Decide to Hold No More Parleys with Insurgents.

Critical Condition of Affairs on the Macedonian Frontier. Invasion of Greece Not Improbable.

Athens, April 9.-The identical notes warning that were delivered by the representatives of the powers to M. Skouzes, the Greek Minister for Foreign Affairs, have had very little appreciable effect. The newspapers declare that they are really of no practical value in rendering the issues more certain, because Greece is well aware that the agreement between the powers is quite factitious.

London, April 9.-The Athens correspondent of the Times says: "The almost unanimous opinion of the Greek newspapers is that the European concert, after a conspicuous failure as Crete, is gradually tending to dissolution, and will be obliged to content itself with a mere admonition. There is an evident disinclination on the part of some of the powers to carry out any programme of coercion, and a weakening of purpose in the European federation, which is showing signs of decrepitude."

NO PARLEYING.

Canoe, Crete, April 9.-The admirals of the foreign powers and the consuls discussed whether the consuls renew parleying with the insurgent leaders. It was decided not to do so. The consuls pointed out that further parley with the insurgents was useless, because they were unable to give them definite information relative to the withdrawal of the Turkish troops. The consuls pointed out that the withdrawal of the Turkish troops was a matter of internal policy, and that the consuls were not to be concerned with it.

MORE BRITISH TROOPS ARRIVE.

A detachment of 600 Russian troops and a detachment of 700 British troops have arrived here.

TURKS MASSING AT KISSAMO.

London, April 9.-The Times this morning publishes the following dispatch from its Crete correspondent: "The Cretans are now massing at Kissamo. They have mounted four guns and intend to attack the fort, which is held by 150 Turks. Yesterday they wrote to the captain of the Austrian fleet anchored in the bay, declaring that the action of the international fleet had hitherto been hostile to them, they would repel forcibly any attempts of the warships to interfere with their designs at Kissamo. It is expected, therefore, that the Cretans will direct their guns against the warships if the latter open fire. It has been decided to remove the few Mohammedan families who are still in the island, and the insurgents drive the Muslims back whenever the latter make attempts to obtain water outside the town."

TURKEY'S PREPARATIONS.

Constantinople, April 9.-An extraordinary council of ministers of the empire was held at the palace yesterday. It is understood that as a result of the Turkish Government will reinforce the troops at Salonica with 22 battalions of Redifs from Anatolia, making a total of 50,000.

POSSIBLE INVASION OF GREECE.

Elisabona, Macedonia, April 9.-The Turkish army remains camped in the positions which it occupied on Wednesday last. The Turks continue strengthening the defenses of the passes leading from Greek territory.

CRETE AND THE COMMONS.

London, April 9.-In the House of Commons, answering a question relative to the evacuation of the island of Crete by the Turkish troops, the Parliamentary Secretary of the Foreign Office said France had asked the powers for their views on the early evacuation of the island by the Turks, but he added, it was impossible to announce the exact date of the withdrawal of the Turkish troops. Several of the powers, he continued, were of the opinion that the Greek troops must first be withdrawn.

Ottawa, April 9.-At a large social gathering of Ottawa Liberals last night, Hon. Clifford Sifton, Minister of the Interior, was a guest. In reply to the toast of "The Government," he said the Ministry had serious responsibilities, but they would carry out a policy of progressive legislation for the benefit of the whole people. Sir Charles Tupper had recently talked as if he regarded the spirited immigration policy of the new Administration as a huge joke. He (Mr. Sifton) did not wonder. The late Government had so mismanaged the interests of the Northwest that it looked as if they regarded the settlement of the country as a joke.

PLAQUE ON THE DECLINE.

Bombay, April 9.-There has been a marked decrease in plague cases. Last week's total was 200 deaths from the plague and 323 cases of that disease, against 538 deaths and 501 cases the previous week.

TWICE DIVORCED.

London, April 9.-The divorce division of the High Court of Justice has granted to Colonel Hon. Frederick Arthur Wellesley, third son of the first Earl of Cowley, a divorce from his wife, Kate Vaughan, the actress, upon the ground of her misconduct with a member of her company of the name of Lorrimer. The action was not defended. This is the second time that Col. Wellesley has been divorced.

IAN MACLAREN.

London, April 9.-At a meeting of the Durham Presbytery, to arrange for the impending meeting of the Synod, Rev. J. Middlemiss, of Sunderland, presided. A letter had been received from Dr. Kennedy Moore had laid upon the table of the Synod a petition charging Rev. John Watson (Ian MacLaren), the well known novelist, with heresy. The petition, however, was not read, but was referred to a committee of the Synod.

CABLE NOTES.

London, April 9.-The wife of Sir Donald Smith, who had been very ill, has recovered, and is expected to improve.

IRELAND EXCLUDED.

From the Proposed Reform in the Law of Evidence.

London, April 9.-Sir Richard Webster, the Attorney-General, moved in the House of Commons the second reading of the law of evidence bill, enabling prisoners in criminal cases to testify in their own behalf. He said that the bill was a result of the long and arduous work of the law reform commission, and that it was a step towards the improvement of the law.

EATEN BY CANNIBALS.

Stuffed With Food for Three Days, Then Served Up at a Feast.

Victoria, B. C., April 9.-An Australian advesee states that Mr. Duncan, a white trader, aged 23, who reached Sydney from South Africa last year, while trading with natives of New Hebrides, was tied up to one of the trees for three days, being kept alive and forcibly stuffed with food. He was then cut down, killed and eaten, women even joining joyfully in the cannibalistic feast.

Death of Rev. Jas. VanWyck, President of the Hamilton Conference.

Hamilton, April 9.-Rev. Jas. VanWyck, pastor of the Gore Street Methodist Church, Hamilton, one of the best-known ministers in the Methodist circuit, died last night of meningitis, after an illness of less than three weeks. He was educated at Albert College, had held charges in Toronto and St. Catharines, and was prepared to accept a call which had been tendered him from the Broadway Tabernacle, Toronto, at the close of the present conference season. He was president of the Hamilton Conference. Mr. VanWyck leaves a widow and two sons. Funeral on Monday.

New York Capitalists Ready to Build an Electric Railway at Once-Rights Through Elgin County Secured-St. Thomas Favorable-Street Railway Company Co-operate.

THE KNOXVILLE BLAZE.

Several Lives Lost-Narrow Escapes-Financial Loss Over \$1,000,000.

Knoxville, Tenn., April 9.-The loss by the fire here yesterday was over \$1,000,000. The loss of life is uncertain. The register of the Hotel Knox, in which 56 persons were sleeping, was burned. The proprietor of the hotel says that he had five or six who have not put in an appearance. A. E. Wick, of Locke, Y. L. Drummer for a Rochester stamping company, is known to have perished in the flames. W. H. Hopkins, a St. Louis drummer, was last seen in the burning building in a suffocating condition. W. H. Schmitt, ex-secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, jumped one story and was injured.
