THURSDAY, SEPT. 16—INTERNATIONAL VISITORS' DAY.

This day is marked in honor of the American visitors, who annually flock to the Fair in large numbers. It is generally known as "Germania Day" in magnitude. At 2 p.m. the bell will call out the first ones to contest the 250 pace and team trotting and pacing—open. Light-weight hunters give exhibitions over the jumps in front of the grand stand. The Hassan Ben Ali will take charge of the attraction programme, and all the specialties will be given.

The last evening exhibition in the ring will be given, starting at 8 p.m. The fireworks will be prepared by Prof. Hand, changing the programme wherever possible. All the special artists will take their places on the amusement platform and entertain patrons until 10:30 p.m.

FRIDAY, SEPT. 17, STOCKMEN'S JUBILEE DAY.

THE CATTLE.

The cattle exhibit excels that of all former years, particularly in the dairy breeds to which increasing attention is being given owing to the growth of the dairy industry. There are about 150 head of Jerseys, Guernseys, Ayrshires and Holsteins, but the Jerseys make the largest showing. Visitors interested in stock raising will find themselves almost bewildered by the very magnitude of the display, and the quality cannot be beaten. There are three exhibits each of Ayrshires and Guernseys, and fine animals they are. There was not many Shorthorns, and the Galloways and Herefords are only fairly represented, though the stock is the choicest. As the judges have made their awards individual mention is omitted here. The prize list will be published as soon as completed.

THE SHEEP.

The sheep exhibit, like that of the cattle and swine, was too large for the accommodation, and temporary quarters had to be provided for the surplus. The heavy class of animals suffered considerably from the heat, especially the Cotswolds. Some of the latter tipped the scales at 250 pounds each, of which a good deal was wool. Perhaps the most largely represented class was the Shropshire, of which there were nearly 60 entries. The Merinos, Dorset Horn and Leicesters also make a capital showing. The whole exhibit proves that the leading breeders are determined to raise the best class of stock.

THE POULTRY.

The poultry show is well filled, but there are some who think the quality is not on a par with the quantity, notwithstanding London's reputation for prize birds. The Leghorns do not come up to expectations, though a few individual ones are first-class. The Poles, Hamburgs and Houdans are strictly first-class all through, but the same cannot be said of the Buff Cochins and Brahmas (excepting the Dark Brahmas). There are some fine Plymouth Rocks and may lack the indications of the well-developed thorough-bred. The water fowl, geese, ducks and turkeys were immense, and the pigeons made not the least attractive portion of the exhibit.

PROMINENT EXHIBITS.
