June 10.
1190—Frederick Barbarossa, emperor of Germany and crusader, drowned in Cerambrone.

1672—The first mint in America began to coin. 1672—Peter the Great, Alexander's son, born near Moscow; died 1725.

1801—The United States entered on a war with Tripoli.

1810—Matthew Simpson, Methodist bishop, born; died 1884.

1820—Three Oxford-Cambridge boat races. Oxford won.

1833—Transatlantic telegraph squadron left Plymouth, England, and commenced laying the cable.

1868—Michael, prince ruler of Serbia, assassinated.

1900—The legislative assembly of Victoria voted unanimously for a federation of the Australian provinces, and the movement at once became vigorous.

1902—Benjamin Harrison recommended for president at the Minneapolis convention by 63 votes out of 107 and Whitehead held out for vice president.

—Mrs. A. G. Clark and Mrs. Mitchell, Niagara Falls, are visiting here.

—Commander Booth, of the Salvation Army, has gone to the Northwest for a five weeks' trip.

—Mrs. W. D. Edy, London, is in town, the guest of her sister, Mrs. Geo. Wilson, Walton street.

—Mrs. Robert Kilgour, of South London, accompanied by her mother, Mrs. T. S. Edwards, of St. Thomas, left yesterday for the World's Fair.

—Some shavings caught fire in the engine-room at the London Foundry yesterday afternoon. The firemen were called out but no damage was done.

—Court Forest Queen has completed arrangements for a three days' excursion to Detroit via Grand Trunk Railway, and to Cleveland via the palace steamer City of Cleveland, from July 1 to 3.

—The case of O'Sullivan vs. O'Neil, tried at the Division Court to-day before Judge Mackenzie, judgment was given for plaintiff for \$20, with costs of this and the former trial. Frank Love for plaintiff; Talbot Macbeth for defendant.

—Rev. Wm. Johnston, pastor of the Spadina Avenue Congregational Church, who will preach in Victoria Hall Sunday evening, is a brother of the well-known Rev. Jas. Johnston, M.D., better known as "Jamaica Johnston," and was also formerly missionary to that island.
