DEATH TRAP BEING BUILT.

George A. Pearson Not To Be Hanged in the Hamilton Jail.

Hamilton, Dec. 3.-This afternoon carpenters began the erection of the scaffold from which George A. Pearson, the murderer of Annie Griffin, his sweetheart, will be launched into eternity. It is being built in the large storehouse in the rear of the jail, and the hanging will take place indoors in- stead of in the yard, as at previous ex- ecutions here.

Sheriff Middleton got the idea of in- side hanging while visiting prisons in the Western States. In view of the feeling of terror which appeared to come over Parrott when he saw the ghastly scaffold, the sheriff adopted the plan to spare Pearson's feelings. He always carries his own rope.

The death warrant arrived here on Saturday, and the sheriff at once went to the jail and read it to Pearson. When told that the executive council had declined to interfere in the case, Pearson said: "It was just what I ex- pected. I must make the best of it."

Mrs. Reid, superintendent of the rescue department of the Salvation Army, has applied for permission to visit the condemned man.

A GIRL EATEN BY A PANTHER!

Blood-Curdling Story From the Wilds of Minnesota--- Movement to Exterminate Beasts of Prey.

Minneapolis, Dec. 4.-A Cartwright, Wis., special to the Times, says: An 8-year-old daughter of C. F. Kiley, a farmer living about 16 miles from here in the Mad Brook settlement, was car- ried away recently by a huge panther and devoured. The little girl was walking in the road near the farm, when the beast sprang from the woods, and taking the girl in his huge jaws, carried her into a swamp, where she met a horrible death, being torn limb from limb. The remains were gathered up and buried.

The community has organized a panther hunt, and the farmers will not lay aside their guns until the brutes shall be exterminated. Since they started out a panther measuring ten feet from tip to tip has been shot and two other large ones have been seen.

MOST FEARFUL SLAUGHTER!

Thirty-Five Women Fall Victims to Chinese Thirst for Blood.

A Governor Pondered Them-Bishop and Many Priests Slain-Return of Punitive Expeditions to Pekin-Slow Progress Made Toward Peace.

Berlin, Dec. 4.-A special dispatch from China to the Volks Zeitung re- ports a fearful mission slaughter in the Province of Shan Si. The first victims, the dispatch says, were a Catholic bi- shop and his coadjutors, and four Eur- opean priests, Franciscans, Italian and French.

The governor invited them to his house, pretending to give them bet- ter protection, but when they arrived their hands were tied and the governor himself pondered them all.

op's residence with a number of sol- diers and seized six Marcellus sisters. He promised them money and distin- guished husbands if they would re- nounce Christianity, but they unani- mously refused. Thereupon the gov- ernor ordered them, and also a num- ber of Chinese priests and 30 Chinese sisters, and 200 orphans, from 3 to 16 years old.

Mr. and Mrs. Atwater and their two little children, Mr. and Mrs. Lagren, and their son, all of the American board, together with Mr. and Mrs. Price, of the Swedish mission, and Miss Eldred, an English woman, were also butchered.

The story of these murders directly implicated Yu Hsien, then governor of Shan Si. Members of Li Hung Chang's staff say the Chinese emperor will probably send Yu Hsien a silk cord, which is an intimation that he must hang himself.

A number of the reports have been published of the June massacres in Shan Si, some of the details being too horrible for print. Men, women, and children were butchered. Fifteen seminary students, who had hidden them- selves in a cistern, were the dispa- iring, tied to stakes and forced to drink the blood of the first victims. They were then killed. A Chinese priest and two Christians who attempt- ed to escape were caught and put in a small hut, where they were burned.

ALLEGED PUNISHMENT.
Berlin, Dec. 4. - A dispatch from Field Marshal Count Von Waldersee, commander-in-chief of the interna- tional forces in China, sent from Pekin, under date of Saturday, says that after holding the German flag at the Ming tombs and punishing sev- eral neighboring villages for the mur- der of Christians, the late Col. York's detachment returned to Pekin in four columns.

The Kaigun expedition, the dispatch also says, was very successful. Sev- eral thousand Chinese regulars were driven in wild flight from the Prov- ince of Chi Li to Shan Si.

UNCLE SAM'S POLICY.
London, Dec. 4. - Comment upon President McKinley's message to Con- gress is chiefly devoted to the refer- ence to America's Chinese policy.

The Daily Graphic says: "The policy of the United States regarding China is not heroic, but it is certainly prac- tical, and there is ample reason to be- lieve that it will prevail."

The Times says: "The message makes it clear that on the point of insisting on punishment for the outrages Mr. McKinley remains firm. We are glad to see that on the subject of guarantee for Christian converts the president makes a new proposal in ad- vance of any put forward elsewhere. In regard to the indemnity question, he is in agreement with some of the best opinion in England."

The Daily News says: "The message will be very closely scanned for its reference to China. It looks as though the American formula were that the powers are to specify the culprits and the Chinese Government is to specify the punishment. On such terms a speedy settlement would undoubtedly be possible, but would it be effective or durable?"

POLITICAL POINTS

Three More Liberals Elected by Acclamation in Quebec.

Excitement in Vancouver-Conservative Caucus Called by Mr. J. P. Whitney.

Montreal, Dec. 4.-The Liberals have secured three more seats in the Que- bec Legislature without opposition. The Conservative candidates in Argenteuil and Shefford have retired, and Mr. Weir and Dr. De Grosbois, the Liberal candidates, have been elected by ac- clamation. In Richelieu, where the contest was between two Liberals, Mr. Rocheleau has retired, and Mr. Fen- aut has been declared elected. This gives the Liberals 34 seats out of 74 in the legislature without opposition.

CALL FOR A CAUCUS.
Toronto, Dec. 4.-A whip has been sent out at the request of Mr. J. P. Whitney, the Conservative leader, to all the opposition members of the legislature and defeated candidates at the provincial general election, invit- ing them to meet at the Albany Club at 11 a.m. on the 5th inst., for the purpose of conferring with him on matters of great interest. The notice signed by Thomas Waddell, the op- position whip in the legislature.

NOTES.
