Michigan Man Finds a Long Lost Gold Finger Ring.

Galesburg, Mich., Dec. 2.—One day early n October, Maxwell Tillbaugh, of Grove in October, Maxwell Tillbaugh, of Grove street, while eating oysters, encountered street, while eating oysters, encountered some hard substance, which proved to be a worn gold ring of peculiar workmanship, and bearing on its inner surface the initials "M. B. T." Forty years ago Mr. Tillbaugh came to Michigan from Nantigo, Md., leaving his parents and two slaves, one of the latter having been his nurse in his childhood, and also a great favority with his mother Singular transfer. favorite with his mother. Singular to re-late, he recognized the ring as one given by his mother to the favorite servant above-mentioned, more than 40 years ago. during which interval both his parents have died and he himself grown wrinkled and gray-haired.

Bankers grew rapidly rich, and so great was their business that in many cases they bought adjacent houses and doubled the size of their banks. Brokers grew rich also, and

bought fine houses, race horses and yachts. Everything flourished. Today all is changed. The bankers are doing no business and in many cases have much depreciated stock upon their hands, which they would gladly get rid of. Brokers are lying wondering how they are going to find money to keep up the houses horses which last season they had plenty of cash to buy. The boerse is half-deserted and business there is well-nigh dead. The piteous lament of women and of the workman's family today rises from one end of the manufacturing portion of the country to the other. Thirty-five thousand workingmen are idle in Berlin alone. All over the country is the same cry, and everyday masters are reducing the number their hands, because there is not work for the hands to do. And with all this the poor people have winter upon them.

NOT SOLD. London, Dec. 2 .- The Right Hon. W. J. Pirrie, head of the great Belfast ship-building firm of Harland & Wolff, denies that he has sold his interest in the White Star Steamship Line to an American syndicate.

SMALLPOX EPIDEMIC IN LONDON. Statistics published today show that since the present outbreak of smallpox in London 116 persons have died of the disease, 233 have recovered and there are 420 cases under treatment. Sixty per cent of persons who had not been vaccinated died, and 20 per cent of those who had been inoculated. There were 57 doubtful cases. The first case was reported on May 20.

MISSIONS IN CHINA TO COMBINE. The representatives of the three great missions in China, the American Board of Foreign Missions, the London Society and the Presbyterian Board are engaged in carrying out the most important scheme for co-operation in the history of missions in China. The consolidated missions will be called the North China Educational Union. They will embrace theological and female schools and the college at Tungchou. Rev. Dr. Sheffield, of the American Board of Foreign Missions, will be president of the united societies.

DECLINE IN SECURITIES. The stupendous fall in British Govvernment, railroad and industrial securities since the South Africa war commenced is almost without precedent. In two years, the Bankers' Magazine says, the net decrease in the value of 325 selected listed securities, amounts to the enormous total of £143.946.000. Consols, which the day before the Boer ultimatum were quoted at 103%, are now 91 13-16, whereas, in the same period, several foreign government stocks and American railroads rose in value about £47.000.000. The decrease in fourteen British and Indian government funds amounted to £76,392,000. The common stock of nineteen British railroads lost in value in the war period over £69,000,000, while the decline in railroad debentures and preferences brings the total loss to over £100.000,006.
