

LIST OF DEAD IS INCREASED

Victims of Baltimore and Ohio Wreck. Now Number 65. -Unknown Dead.

Cornellville, Pa., Dec. 25.—Another name has been added to the long death list resulting from the Duquesne limited wreck on the Baltimore and Ohio at Dawson on Wednesday night. Harry Devlin, one of the three remaining patients at the Cottage State Hospital, died at 10 o'clock yesterday. The total dead now numbers 65, and this probably completes the list, as the two still at the hospital are doing well and will probably recover. Devlin's home was at Lonaconing, Md.

Special services for the dead were held in all the Protestant churches of the city yesterday, and after the burial of Father Fienello, which will take place today, the Catholic churches will have their share. The bodies of about 30 of the victims were taken away on early trains. Those remaining at the hospital are being cared for in the best manner by the borough council. A special meeting has been called to form a committee to look after the bodies of the unidentified victims. In case no friends appear the citizens will be buried in the city.

PITIFUL CASE.

New York, Dec. 25.—Lillian Bennett, who was to have met here and married Ambrose Good, of Newcastle, Pa., who lost his life in the railroad wreck at Cornellville, Pa., Wednesday, arrived yesterday on the steamer Cedric from Liverpool, and was informed at quarantine of her lover's death.

The bridegroom, who was a widower, and in his 71st year, enlisted the services of the Galt press to procure for him a helpmate. Many answered the advertisement, and among them was Mrs. Weston, aged 50. Mathews began correspondence with Mrs. Weston, the outcome of which was last night's wedding.

Eighty-Eight Literature.

Windsor, Ont., Dec. 25.—As a result of the exclusion from the mails of the New Eve Success, a paper issued by the Flying Roll colony of Windsor, the members thereof yesterday issued a circular, which was spread broadcast last evening by the women of the colony, and which attacks Mayors Drake, of Windsor, and the Police Captain Starkweather, of Detroit. These were put on every doorstep, and Chief William Lister, in the evening, catching one of the women in the act, arrested her and locked her up at the police station, where she was registered as Ledaena Messer. The charge made against her is "distributing obscene literature." Her examination will probably take place Saturday.

ABJURE DIVORCE, OR NOT WEDDING

Cleveland Magistrate Has Printed Form to Sign But Gets No Marriage Fees.

Cleveland, Dec. 25.—Justice of the Peace John V. Glinley is determined to discourage divorce. He has a printed form in his desk which he asks those who sign who come to him to get married. The form follows:

"Whereas, we have entered into the solemn pact of marriage, promising before Almighty God to live together as man and wife till death do us part; therefore, we agree, in consideration of the promises, to waive all legal rights for divorce as being incident with our solemn agreement at marriage."

Mount Vernon, N. Y., Dec. 24.—One of the largest private celebrations of Christmas in Westchester county was at All View, the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. Oliver Iselin, at New Rochelle. Following her usual custom Mrs. Iselin gave a Christmas tree to the day nursery of that place. The tree was laden with gifts, which were distributed to the waifs of the town by a Mrs. Santa Claus.

GIFTS TO OLD EMPLOYES

Riding Tobacco Firm Presents \$20,000 to Its Workers of Many Years.

Richmond, Va., Dec. 25.—There was great surprise Thursday in the C. Williams tobacco factory when many of the old employees opened envelopes handed to them and discovered therein checks ranging from \$50 to \$250, aggregating \$20,000, or more. Several months ago the firm, which had been in the tobacco trade here for many years, was absorbed by one of the big corporations.

SUE JOHN MITCHELL

Justice Lyon Denies Motion for Commission to Examine T. D. Nichols.

Binghamton, Dec. 25.—Justice George F. Lyon has denied the application of A. F. Wailes for a commission to orally examine Thomas D. Nichols, of Scranton, Pa., president of district No. 1, United Mine Workers' Association, in connection with the suit against President John Mitchell, of the United Mine Workers' Association, for \$200,000 for services alleged to have been rendered in settling the late coal strike. Justice Lyon held that an oral examination would allow the attorneys to great latitude in propounding questions.

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THE DOINGS AT SAN DOMINGO

Republic Under Arms in Favor of the Former President—Marching on Capital.

San Domingo, Dec. 25.—It is rumored that the greater part of the republic now under arms is in favor of General Jimenez, the former president, who is said to be marching on this city at the head of a large body of insurgents.

"Banker" and Bond Forger Notorious Career of C. P. Hall, Arrested in New York for Arson.

New York, Dec. 25.—One of the Bank of England forgers, the man who in 1877 set fire to Sing Sing prison and escaped in the confusion, has just been arrested in this city at the age of 60, on a charge of arson in the first degree.

He is best known as Charles Williamson, alias Perrine, but he has passed lately as Charles P. Hall, which is said to be his real name. Posting as a retired banker—he was posting as an active banker when in 1876 he flooded Wall Street with forged Buffalo and Erie, New York Central and Chicago and North western bonds.
