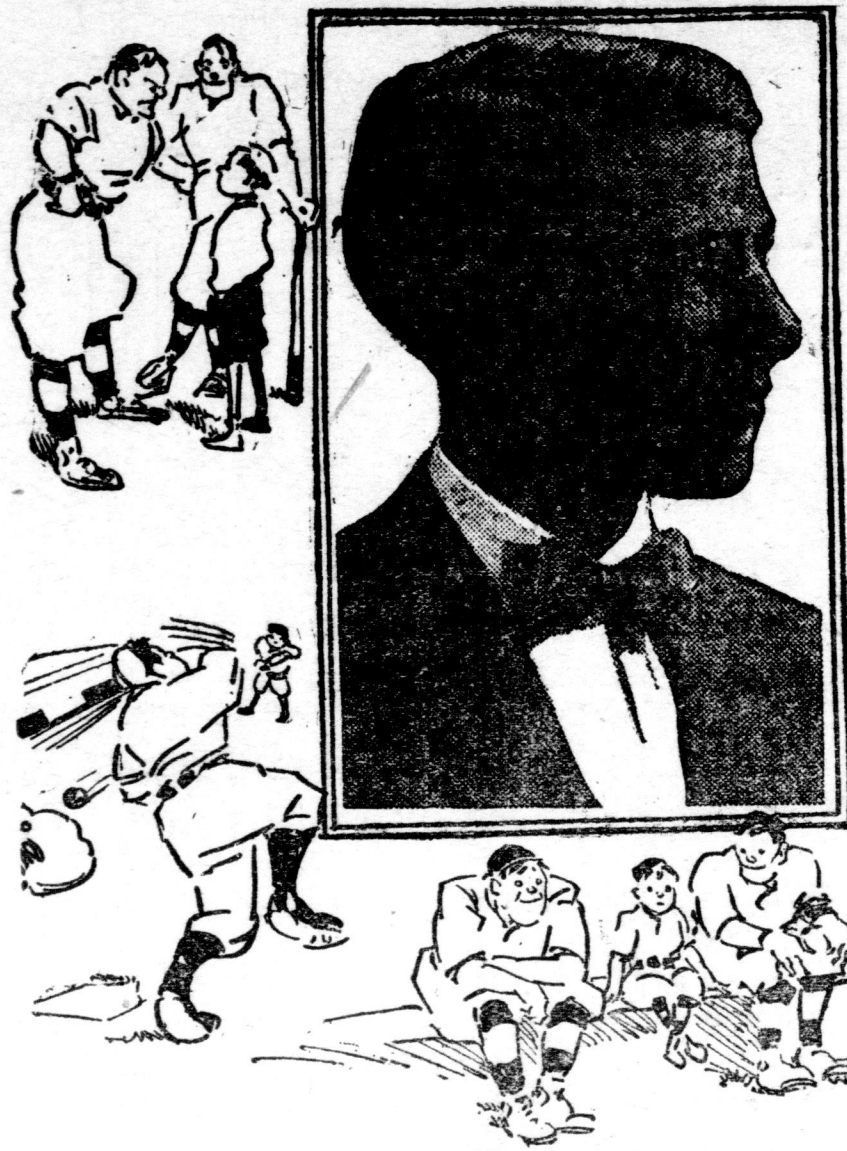

JOHNSON IS NOT A SECOND JACKSON

Coast Sporting Men Refuse to Endow Champion With the Late Peter's Halo.

FAILS TO SCORE LEAD

Cleverness Like Jim Corbett's Does Not Materialize in the Kaufman Bout.

San Francisco, Sept. 15.—Cheerful and urbane, Jack Johnson was cruising around the sporting regions of the city today, but his popularity seems to have waned in a little time, on account of that Al is a big, strong boy, and that in a short contest he may hold his own with the great champion of the future. Johnson's big lead, however, after all the accounts sent in about his being a second Jim Corbett for cleverness, have counted against him.

Depends on Punch.
Kaufman has always depended more on his punch than on anything else, and his own in the sparring line, but he did not show the marked supremacy over Kaufman in boxing and hitting that was expected.

"Johnson is not a second Peter Jackson by a good sight."

This was the remark heard frequently in sporting resorts of San Francisco. Moreover, there was frequently an added statement made to the effect that he was not a second Jim Corbett either, so far as boxing ability is concerned.

Cannot Land Blows.
Tom Corbett, brother of Jim Corbett, was one of those who witnessed the bout. He held against the big black boxer has a fast foot, but that he has to shoot it in when he is off balance and when he cannot put their weight behind it. His most effective blow, according to Corbett, seems to be an uppercut administered at close range.

This was exactly the statement made by Hugh McIntosh, promoter of the Burns and Johnson fight in Australia. McIntosh always said that where Burns lost his chief chance was in his stature. Tommy possesses a punch somewhat of the same order as that held by Johnson, but was too short to land it effectively. Time and again Tommy would miss with the blow and Johnson would counter with exactly the same punch, landing effectively.

No Programme.
McKay offers have been made to Johnson to appear in other bouts here, but his programme is not yet outlined. Kaufman has also received offers for future engagements, both men having had bids for appearances on the vaudeville stage.

Sizing up the whole situation, many here seem to believe that Johnson has distinctly hurt his record by his showing.
