The entry-list-included over 105 rinks selected from the best in Western Ontario and Toronto. The majority of them have been here before on a trophy quest, but the lure-of the contest brings them back again, and they were ready to once more try for the blue ribbon honors for bowlers.

From 2 o'clock until dusk the play continued. All the available rinks at the London Bowling Club were utilized, and a large number of games were played on the Thistle Club greens. This facilitated the weeding-out process considerably, and when the last bowl was hustled towards the kitty last night great progress had been made—more, perhaps, than in any other year.

The bowling was not of the highest quality, being somewhat more ragged than was the custom. However, there were many clever contests.

However, there was a marked improvement in the play late in the afternoon, and today will see as fine an exemplification of the royal game of bowls as could be wished for.
