[Canadian Press.] London, July 21.—Sir William Osler, regius professor of medicine at Oxford, has been voicing the opinion of the medical profession at the inadequacy of the hospital accommodation in England and comparing unfavorably the voluntary system in vogue here with the system in America and Canada, where all hospitals accept paying patients. Throughout the United Kingdom the hospitals accept no pay from their patients, with the result that they are crowded with those who cannot afford to pay, and in many cases are partially closed because the lack of funds will not allow all the beds to be occupied, while people who could afford to pay something have to go to nursing homes, which are in most cases very expensive, or be nursed at home. The result, according to doctors with large practices, is that only the very poor or the very rich get proper med-loa' attention,
