RUSSIA FORCES WAY INTO HUNGARY THROUGH TWO PASSES

Capture Important Station in the Mountains, Taking Huge Stock of War Munitions—Another Success Is Claimed in Bukovina.

LONDON, April 5.—10:50 p.m.—Public attention today is almost entirely directed toward the great struggle for the Carpathian passes, where the Russians apparently are making very steady progress despite the obstinate resistance offered by the Austrian and German troops. The Russians are on the Hungarian side of both the Dukla and Lupkow passes, and with the aid of continual reinforcements are gaining the heights which dominate the passes. Even the Austrian official report admits that fighting is now taking place in the Laborca Valley which is south of Lupkow Pass, while the Russians tonight announce the capture of Cisna, an important station on the high mountains between Lupkow and Uzok passes, where they captured a great stock of war munitions and provisions.

The Russians also are advancing from Dukla Pass on Bartfeld, which is at the head of the line of railway running south in Hungary, and fighting not far from Mezolaborcz, another important railroad head.

On Saturday and Sunday they captured in the Carpathians upward of three thousand prisoners. They also claim another success in Bukovina, and the capture of another thousand prisoners, while the Austrians also assert that they repulsed a Russian force which attempted to cross the Dniester River.

The Russians also are making progress in northern Poland, a German official report telling of the repulse of a Russian attack on Mariampol, which is considerably west of the region which a few days ago was in the possession of the Germans.

PIERCE FIGHTING WITH BAYONET AND ARTILLERY.

PETROGRAD (via London), April 5.—10 p.m.—The following official statement concerning the progress of the war was given out here tonight:
"Along the front west of the Neman River yesterday our troops continued to make successful progress at certain points.

"In the Carpathians during the night of April 3-4, and during the whole of the following day in the region to the north of Bartfeld, there was fierce fighting with artillery and the bayonet. We took twenty officers and more than twelve hundred soldiers prisoners, and captured two machine guns. At the same time we continued to make progress on the front between Mezolaborcz and Uzok. In the course of the day we captured about twenty-five officers and more than two thousand soldiers and took three guns.

"Having occupied the railway station at Cisna (in the Carpathians) on the Galician side, about fifteen miles east of Lupkow, we captured engines and coaches, as well as a great stock of ammunition and part of a provision train.

"There was desperate fighting Wednesday and Thursday near the village of Okna, to the north of Czernowitz (Bukovina), as a result of which we took more than a thousand prisoners while the Austrians had left behind.

"On the other sectors of our front the general situation has undergone no material change."

Austrian Statement.
"VIENNA, April 5.—(Via London, 7:55 p.m.)—The following official statement was given out today at the war office:
"Violent fighting continues in the Laborca Valley and the neighboring region.

"On the other front severe artillery engagements have taken place, but generally it is calm.

"Near Jesebusznie, east of Zaleszowice, a strong hostile force which attempted to cross the Dniester River was repulsed after many hours of fighting. We captured 1,400 men."

GIFFORD PINCHOT DRIVEN AWAY BY THE GERMANS
Special Agent of the United States Not Permitted To Assist in Distributing Food To Destitute.

THE HAGUE, April 5, via London—8:50 p.m.—Gifford Pinchot, ex-chief forester of the United States, who, it is understood, has been acting as special agent for the State Department at Washington, in the European war zone, has been expelled from Belgium by the German authorities.

LONDON, April 5.—10:20 p.m.—It is understood here that Gifford Pinchot, who received an appointment to assist the American commission for relief in Belgium distribute food to destitute French people in the territory occupied by the Germans, was refused permission by the German authorities to enter Belgium.

ACTOR DIES SUDDENLY
Succeeded Man Who Fell Dead During Performance.

He joined the company to take the part left vacant when John Fay Palmer, of Cleveland, fell dead during a performance at Trenton.

BIG LOSS OF HAY.

THREE MORE LIVES AND SHIPS LOST

Additional Disasters Due To Saturday's Storm In Atlantic.

Norfolk, Va., April 6.—Reports of the loss of three additional lives and the wrecking of three schooners in Saturday's storm were received here early this morning. The lost men were of the crew of the schooner Josephine, which pounded to pieces on the North Carolina coast. Captain Creelman is among the missing.

Kill Devil coastguards rescued four of the Josephine's crew of seven. The three missing men had lashed themselves to a mast which toppled over into the sea.

The four-masted schooner William Thomas Moore was wrecked 30 miles northeast of Cape Henry. Captain Jones and his crew were brought here last night by the British steamer Morazan.

The schooner Loring C. Ballard is a total wreck on the North Carolina coast near Gull Shoals. Her crew was rescued.

ITALIAN STEAMER
SUNK BY GERMANS

Genoa Is Aroused By Submarine's Act, and Deep Resentment Shown.

GENOA, Italy, April 5, 1:15 p.m., via Paris, 9:15 p.m.—News was received here today that a German submarine had sunk the Italian steamer Luigi Parodi, which left Baltimore on January 22 with a cargo of coal for Genoa. The report has caused a profound impression here, and there are many expressions of resentment.

The great excitement prevails and the authorities have taken strong measures to protect the German colony and German shops from the possible exaction of reprisals.

Nothing is known as to the fate of the crew of the Luigi Parodi, which was made up entirely of Genoese.

SUPPORTS HIS PLEA
FOR DISARMAMENT

Italian Senator Contends That It Is Necessary To Lasting Peace.

Rome, April 6.—Senator Morandi, former tutor of King Victor Emmanuel, who presented in the Senate a resolution favoring disarmament, has written a long article supporting his views, which, he says, should be discussed more widely if Italy is to turn from neutralism to war, since a lasting peace would be impossible without a partial and simultaneous disarmament of the great nations. He contends that only those countries which intend to prepare for another war immediately after the close of the present conflict can disagree with this view.

Senator Morandi recalls that when the four powers allied against Napoleon considered the French emperor defeated, they agreed in London in June, 1814, to reduce their forces by half, but owing to Napoleon's return from Elba there was no real disarmament of the great nations. He contends that only those countries which intend to prepare for another war immediately after the close of the present conflict can disagree with this view.

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Aviator Pegoud Adds to Records
Drives Off Three Enemy Craft, Then Brings Another Down.

Paris, April 6.—Another daring exploit has been added to the long list of those successfully carried out by Adolphe Pegoud, the famous French aviator, who is reported to have attacked and brought down a German taube near Saint Menesboud, while he was alone on patrol duty April 2.

The report of the incident says that when Pegoud saw the German approaching he flew rapidly towards the hostile aircraft and sent it to earth with a few well-placed shots. Pegoud then landed beside the taube and took prisoner the German pilot and observer, neither of whom was injured.

Earlier in the same day, Pegoud is reported to have driven off three other German aeroplanes, one of which had dropped nine bombs on a railroad station.

Pegoud, who first gained fame in 1913 as the originator of the feat of flying upside down in an aeroplane, was awarded the French military medal early in March for services rendered the army during the war.

ENEMY REPULSED BY BELGIANS IN AFRICA
German Assaults on Congo Territory Fail—Attackers Being Pursued.

Havre, April 6.—Fresh attacks by German forces against the Belgian Congo have been repulsed, according to a report made by the deputy governor at Katanga to the Belgian minister for the colonies. An assault made on Mount Hebu, north of Lake Kivu, a trip from which heavy losses to the Germans, who were pursued into their own territory (German East Africa).

The railroad from Kalo to Lake Tanganyika was completed the middle of March. This line provides an additional element of defence, for it makes possible a trip from Stanley Falls to Tanganyika in less than a week.

GERMANY SUSPENDS PARCEL POST SERVICE

Berlin, via London, April 6.—The German postal officials have suspended until further notice parcel post service to Argentina, Colombia, Costa Rica, Greece, the Italian colonies, the Dutch West Indies, Panama, Portugal, Spain, Uruguay and Venezuela.

DOUBTS AUSTRIA
SEEKING PEACE

Italian Paper Says Germany Would Not Allow Separate Deal.

Rome, April 6.—Any effort by Austria to conclude a separate peace is considered highly improbable by the Giornale d'Italia, which declares the military organization of the dual monarchy is in the hands of Germany, forming with her "only one body, if not one soul."

The paper argues, therefore, that Germany might prevent even materially any effort of Austria to come to terms separately with the nations now arrayed against her.

Such a step would be also highly humiliating to Austria in her relations with Serbia, the Giornale d'Italia says, as well as a confession that the central empires considered themselves beaten.

"Austria," the paper says, "represents merely a military embarrassment for Germany, but she represents also a large contingent of men and materials diverting the Russian avalanche from Germany. Germany might permit negotiations only if she desired them to be the first step toward a general peace."

WANTS ENERGETIC
ATTACKS IN SERBIA

Reason For Von Der Goltz's Personal Visit To Kaiser Wilhelm.

Paris, April 6.—The real purpose of the trip to Berlin made by Field Marshal Von Der Goltz, German military adviser to Turkey, telegraphs the Journal's Athens correspondent, was to convince Emperor William of the necessity for a new and more energetic attacks against Serbia under the command of the field marshal.

Such an attack, the Journal's correspondent says, is considered essential by German officers in Constantinople, in order to establish communications necessary to enable them to obtain supplies of ammunition, which are needed badly. Another purpose of such a move, hopes that it might turn the neutral Balkan nations against the Triple Entente, for it is believed in Constantinople that the delay in the Dardanelles operations has been a disappointment to partisans of the Allies.

WOMEN OF CHICAGO
VOTING FOR OFFICIALS

Largest Vote Ever Cast Expected To Be Today's Result.

Chicago, April 6.—More than three-quarters of a million men and women were eligible to vote at today's election for mayor, city treasurer, city clerk, one judge of municipal court, and 38 aldermen.

A number of bond and annexation proposals were on the ballot. The total registration was 763,106, of whom 488,815 were men and 274,291 were women. The candidates for mayor are: William Hale Thompson (Republican).
