MORAN IS NEARLY AS BIG AS WILLARD

Figures Show Little Difference Between Men.

WILLARD IS THE TALLER

Both Have Same Reach, and Each Has Displayed Powerful Punch.

The logical white hope candidate for championship honors is Frank Moran of Cleveland. He is very anxious to get Jess Willard, a much larger man, into the ring for any really popular heavyweight champion ought to be able to make \$500,000 before he is knocked out.

Here are the measurements of the two men, by which it may be seen that Moran is nearly as big as any heavyweight champion, and larger than most. But Willard by all odds the biggest heavyweight champion the ring has known.

Chicago Report Says Hermann Will Be Ousted

Rumor Has It That National Commission Will Be Reorganized.

GIANTS BUY KAUFF AND TWO OTHERS

Famous Federal League Star Goes to New York.

PRICE NOT DIVULGED

Deal Puts an End to Rumors That Sinclair Will Purchase New York Club.

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—It was announced today by President Harry N. Hempstead, president of the New York National League Baseball Club, that he had purchased Benny Kauff, star outfielder of the Federal League, and two other Federal League players. The two other Federal League players, who are: W. A. Rariden, catcher, of Newark, and Fred Anderson, pitcher, of Buffalo. The deal was made through Harry F. Sinclair, who has held an option on the services of the three players. The money consideration was not divulged by President Hempstead.

Among baseball men it is believed that Sinclair's action in selling the players to the Giants virtually ends all rumors that he was to purchase the Giants.

Thames Park Rink Is For All Boys' Hockey Sevens

Any Hockey Team in City Is Welcome to Use Privileges.

Some misunderstanding has arisen from a statement made in one of the local papers to the effect that the rink which the public utilities board has made in Thames Park was to be used by the schools of the city for hockey games. This is not the case. The rink is open to teams made up of boys who are too poor to hire a rink for their games. The rink is open to all teams of boys in these circumstances, and no charge will be made for it. The utilities board has provided a shed for clothing, with a stove in it, and a man to attend to the rink and clear off the snow.

"It is quite possible," said Secretary Taylor, director of physical training, at the "X" this morning, "that a school league team will be formed. We have received so many requests to be allowed to enter the league from schools which have read of it in the paper, that we are certain that it would be a success."

"The only difficulty is in finding a man to form the league and draw up a schedule of games," continued Taylor. "I cannot do it. My time is fully occupied in my present work, and so far all the men who have the qualifications are anxious enough to assist in forming it, and doing any of the hard work of drawing up schedules and refereeing games. I feel certain that a league would be formed if we could only find someone willing to direct it."

Kilbane Boosts Mitchell as Next Lightweight King

Cleveland Champion Likes Milwaukee Scrapper's Style and Says He Will Be Hard Man to Beat in Lightweight Division.

CLEVELAND, Jan. 17.—Johnny Kilbane, featherweight champion, has fought across the country from coast to coast in the eight years he has been in the ring and has just come upon a left hand he says is the greatest in the game. It belongs to Ritchie Mitchell, the Milwaukee lightweight.

"I thought when I beat Abe Attell for the featherweight title I had beaten the best left hand in the business, but I found a better one when I met Mitchell in Cincinnati the other day," said the champion.

A Troublesome Left.
"Mitchell had his left in my face all the time. There was not much sting to it when he used it for jabbing, but it was a tantalizing thing and it is going to do Mitchell a lot of good in his chase for the lightweight championship."

No Chance to Plan Sleep Punch.
The featherweight champion's efforts to step in and land a haymaker were repeatedly frustrated by Mitchell's left, which shot out time and again at just the right time to hold off his opponent.

"Mitchell has a bright future," said Kilbane. "At the rate he has improved in the past several months he ought to be champion in another year."

Willard Starts Training Himself For Moran Bout

Jack Curley on Way to Obtain Moran's Signature to Contract.

Kansas City, Jan. 18.—Jesse Willard, heavyweight champion of the world, who last night signed an agreement to meet Frank Moran of Pittsburgh in a 10-round fight in New York between April 10 and 22, started today to condition himself for the contest. Willard went to Excelsior Springs, Mo., and it is there he intends to do some of the preliminary training, which will include light roadwork and perhaps boxing.

Jack Curley, who is promoting the fight, is on his way today to New York to get Moran's signature to the contract.

The articles of agreement, which give Willard \$25,000, or the privilege of 45 per cent of the gate receipts after the state tax is deducted, and 51 per cent of the motion picture rights, stipulate that unless Moran is signed by February 1 the contract becomes void. The contract also calls for Willard's appearance in New York City at least 30 days before the fight. Curley stated that he intends to hold the fight in the open air.

FRANKIE FLEMING GETS CHANCE WITH KILBANE

Toronto, Jan. 18.—Frankie Fleming, the Montreal boxer who is to meet Tommy O'Keefe of New York at the Irish Regiment's tourney, in which Frank Moran will appear, has been promised a match with Kilbane. The meeting with the champion is contingent upon him defeating E. Camp, Ed. Wallace and Patsy Brannigan, all classy fighters.

Fleming is in good shape, and if he ever clashes with the titleholder he can get lots of Toronto backing.

BILLY ROOKS SAYS MORAN WILL HAVE GOOD CHANCE

William Rooks, the Detroit referee, who is visiting his mother here, received word from New York today that Jess Willard and Frank Moran had been matched to fight in New York during the latter part of April or the first week of May.

"It should be a good battle," said Mr. Rooks. "I would like to see them over a longer route. If Moran lands he will go some damage, but Willard cannot be beaten in that time."

MIKE GIBBONS MEETS YOUNG AHEARN TONIGHT

[Canadian Press.] St. Paul, Minn., Jan. 18.—Both Mike Gibbons and Young Ahearn are declared to be in excellent condition today for their ten-round, no-decision bout here tonight. Ahearn, weighing about 135 pounds, will have a four-pound advantage on Gibbons. Gibbons, jumping from Ahearn by a knockout in their previous meeting in New York, June 13, 1915.
