The Prefect's name is Mantoff. At the time of the attack he was walking with a man named Jacobson, who is a dragonan attached to the Russian Consulate at Rustehuk. Jacobson had for a long time been engaged in an attempt to bribe Mankoff with large sums of money. He had induced the Prefect to go to Bucharest with him to see M. Hitrovo, the Russian Minister to Roumania. Suspicions being aroused that he would not accede to their wishes and would betray their secrets, they decided to have him removed. The result was the attempt to assassinate him. result was the attempt to assassinate hin which, as yesterday's despatches state resulted in a severe wound to Mankoff an the arrest of two or three Bulgarians what attacked him.

The Would-be Assassins Sofia, April 3.- The two men who we imprisoned for making an attempt to assassinate the Prefect of Rustchuk are named Kavasoff and Ivanoff respectively. They are natives of Russian Bessarabia and lived at Rustchuk until the recent revolt occurred, having relations with Kischeneff, the chief of the revolutionary committee.

A CARPENTERS' STRIKE, Sixty-Five Hundred Workmen in Chicago

Will Go Out To-Day.
CHICAGO, April 3.—The 6500 carpe ployed throughout the city and suburbs will cease work to-morrow morning, and building cease work to-morrow morning, and building operations in this county, will be suspended indefinitely. The carpenters, who, after a long struggle last summer, failed to carry out their demands for eight hours and an increase of wages decided then to renew the contest. Three months ago the Carpenters' Councilgave notice to employers that at the beginning of April the men would demand 35 cents an hour, eight hours to constitute a days work. Wages have been averaging 25 cents and a day's work from eight hours to ten hours.
