REMARKABLE LETTER WRITTEN BY TREASURER COADY.

The Solicitors for Wilson Smith of Montreal, Ontario, and Treasurers of the City of Montreal, have received a letter from the City Treasurer stating that the City Council had accepted the recommendation of the sub-committee of the Executive in regard to the sale of Toronto City bonds.

The letter, which is a long one, has been kept strictly secret by the authorities at the City Hall, although the lawyers supplied the Mayor with type-written copies for the press, but in spite of this, the contents of the communication have leaked out.

The most important piece of information in the document is a copy of a letter Mr. Smith says he received from Treasurer Coady, in which he was asked to understand that his tender had been accepted by the members of the Executive to say whether he had accepted the tender. Mr. Smith replied that he had sent a telegram stating that the offer had been accepted by the City Council, and that he had not intended to make any mention of having forwarded a letter.
