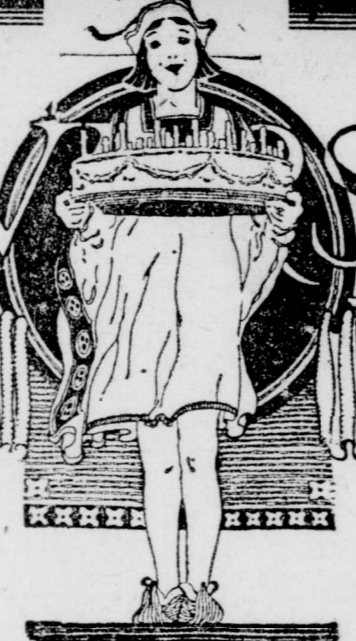
MARRIAGE OF JEWS BY CLERGYMAN ANNULLED

Bride a Minor and Says She Thought Officiating Minister Was a Rabbi.
MONTREAL, Feb. 25.—(Canadian Press Dispatch.)—Justice Bruneau today annulled the marriage of Bertha J. Spiegel, a Jewish girl, and N. A. Atkinson, performed by Rev. F. S. Sproule, a Methodist minister, on the ground that the bride had been misled by the groom into believing the ceremony was performed by a rabbi, and also because she was a minor.
Counsel for the appellant presented three grounds for annulling the marriage. First, that Rev. Mr. Sproule was not competent to marry her, she being a Jewess; second, that she was a minor when married and had not her parents' consent; third, that she was led to believe by her husband that she was being married by a rabbi. The first pretension was at once dismissed on the recent Privy Council judgment in the Tremblay-Despatie case, and counsel for the petitioner abandoned this pleading and argued on the other two.

WOULD-BE ROBBER SHOT.
DETROIT, Feb. 25.—An armed bandit who attempted to hold up a sweet side branch of the Dime Savings Bank here this noon, was shot and probably fatally wounded by Harvey Rheaume, manager of the bank. He had fired four shots over the heads of clerks and a guard to scoop up money lying on the counter when Rheaume fired at him.
