

MAKE CANADA A DUMPING GROUND

United States Would Like to See Tariff Down

S. F. GLASS MEETING

Harding Hall at Thorndale Packed to Capacity

THORNDALE, Nov. 29.—Harding's Hall was packed to capacity to-night and great enthusiasm was evinced for S. Frank Glass, National Liberal and Conservative candidate for East Middlesex. Walter Bryan was chairman of the evening. In addition to the Miss Brodigan, of Toronto, and A. Ferguson, a Simcoe farmer and member of the U.F.O.

Miss Brodigan was strong in her support of the Meighen administration. She pointed out that women should pay particular attention to the platforms of the three leaders, and that the one which would be in the best interests of Canada. It would not be wise to choose erratic policies such as laid down by the Liberal and Progressive forces.

The speaker pointed out that goods brought abroad left the money abroad but goods bought in Canada keep money circulated here. She declared the United States was overproduced by 12 years and that that country was very anxious to make Canada a dumping ground for these products.

KEEP OUT OF POLITICS. Mr. Ferguson, during the course of his speech, criticized the farmers for getting into politics. He said when the U. F. O. was organized in 1905 it was stipulated that politics was to be avoided. The prices of farm implements and wheat came in for some discussion. In regard to implements, he said it was not worth while having the duty taken off them so far as the farmer was concerned. It was far better to keep Canada's industries in operation.

Mr. Glass dealt with the farmers' cooperative company and charged that stock had been sold to the farmers, but that the profits were being secured by only a few. Wheat grown in Canada was wanted by the United States, he said, for that country could not compete with foreign trade with the quality of wheat grown across the border. Canada should look to Europe for markets.

CHARGES REFUTED. Charges made in London that Mr. Glass had told the farmers he was in favor of allowing their sons exemption during the war were refuted. Mr. Glass said that he and Mr. Ross had been called to a meeting in London in 1917. Mr. Ross did not attend. At that meeting the position of the speaker was made clear. He would not put the farmers in the position of having to answer such a question. He would, however, urge that every farm be left with one efficient head, for production was one of the great needs of the day.

McGILLIVRAY SCHOOL CLOSED FOR A WEEK

CLANDEBOYE, Nov. 29.—No. 4 school, McGillivray, is closed for the week, owing to the illness of Miss Aikman, being called home by the serious illness of her mother.

Instead of obtaining money by means of the usual sewing bee, members of the Women's Missionary Society, of the Methodist Church, Clandeboye, are making a collection of fruit for the sick children's hospital in London, each member giving a jar or two of her own preserving. The society here is still under the presidency of Mrs. Frank Kent.

The open fall is giving the farmers a good chance to finish plowing and get woodpiles in readiness for winter. With cattle still on grass, the feed will be greatly saved in silos and barns. The only crop not silted is the turnips, which heat and rot easily.

SAY KITCHENER CHIEF GOES TO ST. CATHARINES

ST. CATHARINES, Nov. 29.—William Early, chief of the St. Catharines fire department for 16 years, was last night placed on the retired list by the Council, with an allowance of \$5,700, and chief H. Guerin, of Kitchener, appointed as his successor at a salary of \$2,350. Chief Early joined the St. Catharines fire department as a driver 43 years ago. NOT DEFINITIVE YET.

KITCHENER, Nov. 29.—Fire Chief H. Guerin, of the local fire department, who was appointed chief of the St. Catharines department, has not given a definite reply to the council of that city. The fire and light committee of this city will endeavor in every way possible to obtain his services. Chief Guerin came to Kitchener from Hamilton in 1916, and has given excellent service to the city.

Sarnia Council Takes Up Commission System

SECURE OPINION IN JANUARY

\$50,000 Wanted Under Ontario Housing Act

SARNIA, Nov. 29.—The City Council last night adopted unanimously the recommendation of the local Chamber of Commerce that a referendum be taken during the civic election in January in order to get an expression of opinion from the people on the adoption of a commission manager form of government for the city. The Council also adopted a resolution, recommending that the sum of \$50,000 be provided for the use of the housing commission in order to care for some of the applications received for loans under the Ontario Housing Act. A communication was also received from the Chamber of Commerce, urging the Council to draft and submit a by-law to the ratepayers, authorizing the expenditure of not less than \$25,000 and not more than \$50,000 for industrial sites, which may be allocated by the industrial committee, the Council or a joint committee of both. The Council also went on record as being opposed to the levy imposed upon the city for a portion of the cost of suburban roads, amounting to \$200,000. A letter was ordered forwarded to Hon. Mr. Biggs, setting forth the Council's views on the matter.
