

# Estimate of Crops

The Government report, issued July 14th, of the state of the crops, is as fol-

lows:- During June the crops throughout Canada maintained generally the favorable average of a month ago. On June 30 the condition, expressed in percentage of the usual standard of 100, taken as of the usual standard of 100, taken as representing the promise of a full crop, was as follows:—Fall wheat 81.46, spring wheat 87.80, oats 77.71, barley 88.39, rye 85.95, peas 87.43, mixed grains 87.12, hay and clover 71.52, alfalfa 77.23 and pasture 82.31. By provinces the condition is between 80 and 90 for the Maritime provinces, Quebec, Ontario and Manitoba. In Saskatchewan and Alberta the outlook at the end of June seemed to be especially promising, as the condition was above 90 in all cases excepting fall wheat, the condition of which in Alberta was 76.27.


