

### WILD DUCK FOODS

(Experimental Farms Note)

The majority of the plants which are important as sources of food for Wild Ducks are, as might be expected, those which occur either in water or in marshes. A few land plants, however, find a place on the list of which the principal is Barnyard Grass (*Echinochloa crus-galli*). This is an annual species, introduced from Europe, which grows well on waste ground and on the margins of lakes. It is the seed of this plant which is eaten.

Of importance also are the Smartweeds (*Polygonum*) most of which occur on wet soil and have a wide distribution in Canada.

Other important swamp plants are the Bur Reed (*Sparganium eurycarpum*), Bulrush (*Scirpus validus*), Meadow Grass (*Panicum urticaria*) and Cord Grass (*Spartina Michauxiana*). The first three occur all over Canada while the last extends from Nova Scotia to Saskatchewan. These and various other species are all important food-plants of Wild Ducks.

Occupying a foremost place among water plants, Wild Rice (*Zizania aquatica*) occurs from New Brunswick to Lake Winnipeg. A full description is given of it in Bulletin 42 Second Series of the Experimental Farms Branch.

Water Celery (*Vallisneria spiralis*) extends from Nova Scotia to the Great Lakes. No less important as Duck foods are the various species of Potamogeton (*Potamogeton*) most of which have a wide distribution.

Two species of the Waterlily Family, namely, Water Shield (*Brasenia Schreberi*) which extends from Nova Scotia to Manitoba, and the Yellow Waterlily (*Nuphar advena*) which extends west to the Rocky Mountains are worthy of mention. The seeds only of the second species are of importance.

The Pickerel Weed (*Pontederica cordata*) is native in Eastern Canada only.

Finally, of importance in salt and brackish water are the Tassel-Pondweeds or Widgeon-Grass (*Ruppia*) and Eelgrass (*Zostera marina*) the latter of which occurs on both the Atlantic and Pacific coasts.

The Biological Survey of the United States Department of Agriculture at Washington, D.C., has issued a number of important Bulletins on this subject.

## DEATH OF CAPT. ELROY PECK

This Well Known Master Mariner Made Many Successful Trips During the Big War

Bear River, N.S. Sept. 6.—On Wednesday, the 31st ult., after an illness of some months, there passed away at Bear River, N.S., Captain Elroy Peck at the age of forty years.

Captain Peck was the son of Joseph and Sarah Peck, of Greenland, N.S. Leaving home at an early age he chose the sea as his vocation and spent some five years in local vessels after which he entered the employ of the Red Cross Line, where his marked ability soon secured promotion. About ten years ago he became first officer on a steamer of the W. R. Grace Company of New York. He advanced rapidly and the year before the war was given command of one of their larger boats and during the first years of the conflict made several trips to Europe, carrying munitions for the Allies. It was during one of these trips that his steamer successfully engaged a submarine, sinking her with gun fire.

At the time of the Halifax explosion his steamer, the Curaca, partially loaded with munitions was lying in Halifax Harbor awaiting a consignment of horses for France. In the explosion, the Curaca was sunk and the entire crew of sixty men lost their lives. Captain Peck with his wife, was on board until the day before, when he was called to Deep Brook on account of the death of his mother, otherwise no doubt both he and his devoted wife would have met the same fate, as the officers and crew. The strain of voyages made in those strenuous times followed by the shock and anxiety attending the loss of his officers and crew and subsequent raising of the ship, no doubt was responsible for the break in his otherwise splendid health.

His next command was the Surico of the Transmarine Boat Incorporation in which he made several voyages to the Continent. In March last he came home much broken in health and it was soon seen that recovery was impossible.

He was a highly respected member of the Keith Lodge A.F. and A.M. and Friendship Lodge I.O.O.F.

He leaves to mourn their loss a loving and devoted wife, Francis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John H. York of Bear River, two sisters, Mrs. Wm. Curtis of Deep Brook, Miss Beatrice of Boston, as well as two brothers, John, of Hudson, Mass., and Ernest of Marlboro, Mass.

The funeral was attended by Rev. Mr. Mack, of the Methodist Church, both Lodges of which he was a member attending in regalia. The services at the grave were under the direction of the Masons, whose burial ceremony was most impressive.


