Ajeōk'chemin, a blackberry.
Akkāda, abundance of things; plenty of ground-nuts; hence *Acadie* (French).
Akūm, a snow-shoe, raquette.
Amlamēkw', a mackerel.
Anesaak, Salmon River.
Ansaakw, New Harbor.
Apchechkūmoochwāākāde, Duck land. Hence the French name *Canard River*.
Āpsiboogwēchk', Port le Bear.
Aseedik, Lunenburg.
Asoemanōkse, a creeping blackberry vine.
Aspatogon, a headland on the Atlantic.

Banook, the first lake as you ascend a river.
