#### OFFICERS AS COMPETITORS IN RIFLE MATCHES.

### To the Editor of the Canadian Militia Gazette:

DEAR SIR,—The question, should commissioned officers compete in the Dominion and providcial rifle association matches, has been brought before the active militia in a very public manner by some remarks made at the presentation of prizes won at the Nova Scotia provincial rifle association matches. There has been a feeling existing for some time in the active force, particularly among the non-shooting members, that some of the commissioned officers who compete on the rifle range take too large a proportion of the prizes offered, and the lists have been arranged so as to include a larger number of the less skillful marksmen, by reducing the amounts of the leading prizes, and adding a number of less value. But the remarks made on the evening of the fifth inst, were the first public expression of such sentiments from an official quarter, and as such are worthy of the serious consideration not only of the commissioned officers who shoot but of the whole force.

What would be the effect of a regulation prohibiting commissioned officers from competing with non-commissioned officers and privates at the provincial and other rifle matches? Would it be beneficial or otherwise? There are probably some very differ-
